World Prayer Day Pentecostal Church

The Women's Inter-church Council, which plans for the observance of the "World Day of Prayer" in Canada, earnestly hopes that all women's organizations in the co-operating churches will share in the interest and responsibility involved in the conduct of the "World Day of Prayer". The primary purpose of the Inter-Church Committee has been to unite the members of the Women's Missionary Societies in Canada in prayer for missions.

The first inter-denominational prayer meeting in Canada in 1919 was so great an event in the history of Women's Missionary work that it was decided to repeat it in the following year. This was done, but with an important change. By complying with the request of the U.S.A. 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P.S.I. Community Health Plan Open for Five Days

The P.S.I. sponsored Halton County Community Health Plan will remain open for five days, Monday, March 1, 1965.

This year's offering will be of short duration — Monday, March 1, 1965 through Friday, March 5, 1965. No applications can be accepted after the closing date.

The P.S.I. plan is widely recognized as the answer to the problem of paying physicians' bills. It provides first call coverage for physicians' services at home, in the office and in the hospital. The plan pays for surgery, x-rays, anaesthesia, obstetrics, care and many other benefits.

All permanent residents of Halton County are eligible to enroll. There is no age limit, no enrollment fee, no medical examination.
