

# First Annual Meeting Community Credit Union

On Saturday, February 27, Acton Community Credit Union Limited held its first and successful annual meeting in St. Alban's Parish Hall, Acton. Opening the meeting at 7:15 p.m., president Bob Drinkwater commented on the progress the credit union had made in its first year of operation with close to 200 members on the books at the year's end.

At the closing of his opening remarks, he introduced Acton's Mayor Les Duby, who after a congratulatory speech wished the membership a successful future.

John Last, the secretary, read the minutes of the charter meeting, and this was followed by the report of the Board of Directors.

Treasurer's report was presented by John Last who took over from Jules Frijters at union headquarters on October 1964. Jules took over full-time management of the Holy Rosary Parish Credit Union in Milton.

Credit Committee report was presented by Brendan Aherne, and Supervisory Committee by Frank Grundinger. Both gave favorable reports.

Dispensing with unfinished business, new business, attention was turned to the approval of an amendment of the by-laws thereby increasing the Board of Directors to seven.

Officers for the year 1965 will be president, Bob Drinkwater; vice-president, Jim Pape; treasurer, John Last; secretary, Brendan Aherne; directors, Charles Blake, Louis Dick and Bob Bruce.

Members voted to divide the profits by paying 4% dividend on shares and a 10% rebate on interest paid by borrowers — excellent for somewhat less than 12 months operation.

# New Authority Foundation To Preserve Old Buildings

The Credit Valley Conservation Authority Foundation was formally established when the inaugural meeting of the trustees was held last week. Responsible for financing and carrying out the recommendations of the Historical Records Advisory Board, the Foundation was set up by the Credit Valley Conservation Authority.

R. F. Hardy, Humber, was elected chairman, R. R. Parker, Acton, was elected first vice-chairman and J. W. Pawley, Brampton, second vice-chairman. Additional trustees are R. C. McMillan, Streetsville and E. M. White, Orangeville. G. W. Bentley, Streetsville, is secretary-treasurer.

**—Recreate Era**  
Among the projects planned for the Foundation is the preservation and recreation of industrial buildings which once flourished in the Credit River watershed, complete with machinery and equipment, if these can be found. Mr. Hardy said that he hopes a

grist mill and a saw mill may be established in a combination with one or more of the reservoirs to be built by the CVCA.

Another expectation is the rebuilding of an electrical generating plant at one reservoir, utilizing some of the obsolete equipment available on the river. Negotiations are being carried out to acquire a single room school house, complete with desks, stove and slate boards to preserve for posterity the "little red school house" famed in local history.

Funds for these projects, in which no provincial grants are available, will be sought from in and outside the watershed, who corporations and individuals who are enthusiastic about preserving for the coming generations to come, the visible record of past achievements in the Credit River Valley.

## Township Approves Agreement \$2800 for Area Fire Protection

Nassagaweya Council Monday adopted a new agreement with the Acton fire area for a three year period. The new agreement will cost the township an estimated \$2800 annually for fire protection of that section included in the Acton area. The total \$7000 annual cost is shared with Essex and Erin townships.

By resolution the council also agreed to pay representatives to fire area committee at the rate of \$10 a meeting and 10 cents a mile. Representatives to the Milton area are also paid for attendance at meetings, it was pointed out.
