Wife of Riverdale M.P. Talks to Halton N.D.P.

The New Democrat organization in Halton County held its February 15 meeting in the School workers' Hall in Milton with Mrs. James Renwick as guest speaker for the evening. Mr. Renwick was the winner in the recent by-election in Riverdale riding and Mrs. Renwick outlined to those present the interests which had led Mr. Renwick to the New Democratic Party and later to the legislature. Mrs. Renwick stated that as a lawyer and then as a politically active citizen, her husband had increasingly seen the need for government action to help those in our society who were not benefiting from the present booming economy. Those whom he felt were in special need were the widows, fatherless children, those without the ability to gain a high education, and the disabled. At the same time, she pointed out that one-third of Canada's people lived in a state considered poverty by social scientists, the government had taken little action in order to correct the situation. One of the most urgent needs, Mrs. Renwick stated, was the necessity for research to determine the causes behind those living in conditions which we could never stand ourselves. One of the immediate ways in which government could help would be tax cuts to those in the active citizen, her husband had low income groups. In a down-turning economy, Mrs. Renwick said, it was not easy to take action which could relieve conditions of oppression and destitution, but when we were enjoying an upgrade all the way, there was no excuse for inaction by those whose office it was to lead the people of Canada.
