Eramosa Township Council Debates Road Expenditures

Rockwood — The regular meeting of Eramosa Township Council was held in the Rockwood Town Hall last night. All members, Reeve Carman Lush, Deputy Reeve Fred Cox, Councillors Jos L. Oakes, Earl McKenzie and D. H. Story were present and the Reeve presided. Also in attendance were the Road Superintendent R. Hamilton, the Assessor John Carter, Groves Hospital representative F. Armstrong and Clerk L. Hindley.

The minutes of the last regular meeting and special meetings were read and adopted and the following correspondence was discussed: From the Canadian Red Cross Society regarding a donation to the Department of Energy and Resources on Flood Committees, from Read, Voorhees and Associates about master road survey. A letter from the Arthur Public School Board concerning the debtore by-law and from the Department of Agriculture in regards to Weed Inspector. Word was received from Fergus District High School regarding equalized assessment, also from a ratepayer about assessment and tax adjustment. There was a letter from the Department of Highways regarding 1964 annual returns and the 1965 road expenditure by-law.

Franklin Armstrong discussed with council the financial position of Groves Memorial Hospital, Fergus.

The assessor, John Carter and council discussed the assessment of the township and Mr. Carter brought to council's attention that a new form of assessment notice was required as per the Assessment Act.

Road Expenditures

The road superintendent and council discussed the road expenditure by-law and agreed on an expenditure as follows: \$16,300 construction and \$33,000 maintenance, subject to the approval of the Dept. of Highways. The clerk was instructed to obtain legal advice regarding a ratepayer's request for assessment and tax adjustment, and to have the Fergus High School District representative present at the next meeting.

Nylon Factories In Korea Cited

Rockwood — Mrs. John Benham was hostess to the members of Unit 3, United Church Women recently for their March meeting. The leader, Mrs. McRae was in the chair. Her opening thought was "Spreading the Gospel", followed by a hymn and prayer. There were 16 present and everyone was given a sincere welcome. A short business period followed.

An article on the nylon factories in Korea was read by Mrs. Evelyn Murray. The Devotion was taken from Luke 9; and read by Anne Benham with prayer by Evelyn Murray. Mrs. Alice Nichol and Mrs. Lois Tosh read articles on Lent; its customs and meanings. This was very appropriate at this time of year, reminding us why Lent is observed.

The theme of the meeting was "Missions of the Church", and an interesting film "The Church Around the World", was shown. The meeting closed with a hymn and the Benediction.

Seek Tenders

Moved by Messrs. Storey and McKenzie that the road expenditure for 1965 amounting to \$49,300 be given the necessary readings, passed and numbered 81965, subject to the approval of the Department of Highways. A motion was passed that the Road Superintendent be authorized to advertise for tenders for supplying, crushing and delivering 10,000 yards of gravel (more or less), same to be according to specifications of Road Superintendent. Tenders to close at 12 o'clock noon April 5, 1965.

The Council instructed the Road Superintendent to advertise for tenders for a new maintainer and snow plow subject to the Road Superintendent's specifications and Department of Highways approval. Tenders to be received by 12 o'clock noon, April 5, 1965.

Accounts amounting to \$7,202.21 (Road accounts, \$5,942.99; general accounts \$1,259.22), were passed for payment and the meeting adjourned to meet Monday, April 5 or at the call of the Reeve.

The Council decided to make a donation of \$25 to the Red Cross Society (Guelph Branch) for the year 1965. Jack Pearl and Frank Schneider are authorized to care for the Cenotaph and charge the township with the cost.

The newly formed children's choir sang throughout the service.

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

Flood Relief Project Sitting High and Dry

K. C. Lindsay, clerk of Esquering township, Tuesday refuted a report in a Toronto daily newspaper claiming a flood relief committee appointed following the Glen Williams flood had been refused help by both county and township councils.

In clarifying details to date, the clerk reported following the flood when several Glen Williams residents' homes received damage, Esquering council representatives visited the office of Wilfrid Spooner, Municipal Affairs Minister.

At this time, the minister directed council as to what action to take and suggested formation of a committee to act as a "Flood Relief Committee." Township council's next move was to contact several residents, William Korzak, Roland Haines and Thomas Hill agreed to serve.

The following evening, Esquering council called a special meeting with these men and relayed instructions given by the minister. Within two days' time a letter indicating the men would resign was received by the clerk. In a conversation with them, Mr. Lindsay learned Mr. Korzak and Mr. Haines definitely resigned but Mr. Hill agreed to attempt formation of a committee. His efforts were fruitless and no one could be obtained. Following these efforts, he too resigned.

At no time was there an approach made to either county or township councils for assistance. Esquering council still the committee when first formed to proceed as directed by the minister and make a canvass in an attempt to raise funds. The committee was instructed to return to council for consideration of a donation after this was done. According to Mr. Spooner's directive, the provincial government would match dollar for dollar all returns received for flood relief.

Now that formation of a committee appears impossible and no contributions have been made for flood relief, the entire program is at a standstill.

Clerk, Lindsay is of the opinion that the township council has followed the minister's instructions in full. What the next move might be, if any, is not known at present.


