Generous Council Approves Grant

Haltion County councillors were in a generous mood on Tuesday as they granted donations of \$7,100 to eight organizations and also recommended that a \$150 per foot grant be given to the Oakville and District Association for Retarded Children for the purchase of a building for use as an Adult Training Centre.

The recommended grant of \$5,400 will be included in the County's 1965 budget.

Included in the \$7,100 grant total are grants to the Salvation Army, \$1,650; Canadian National Institute for the Blind, \$1,000; Navy League of Canada, \$100; St. John Ambulance, \$200; John Howard Society of Ontario, \$200; Halton County Fire Prevention Bureau, \$1,200; and Lorne Scots Regiment \$2,500.

Requests for grants from the Muscular Dystrophy Association of Canada, Canadian Mental Health Association, Waterloo Lutheran University and the Medical Alert Foundation Inc. were all turned down.

A few other grants have not yet been finalized, councillors noted.
