as you do not use it without. West leads a heart and declarer pauses to plan his play. No rule in bridge will ever re- There is a probable loser in each side and maybe more in hearts. Because dummy's high trump are needed to draw trump, declarer cannot rulf hearts in dummy. Therefore, declarer must look to the diamond suit for ex-

tra tricks. Declarer wins the first trick in his hand and leads the diamond queen. Now it is West's turn to think. To cover or not to cover. All West has to do is pirture what declarer has and what his partner has in dia-

The only play where West should cover is if declarer is leading a singleton queen - a most unlikely play. If West ducks. South can continue with the lack of diamonds. West ducks again. 
