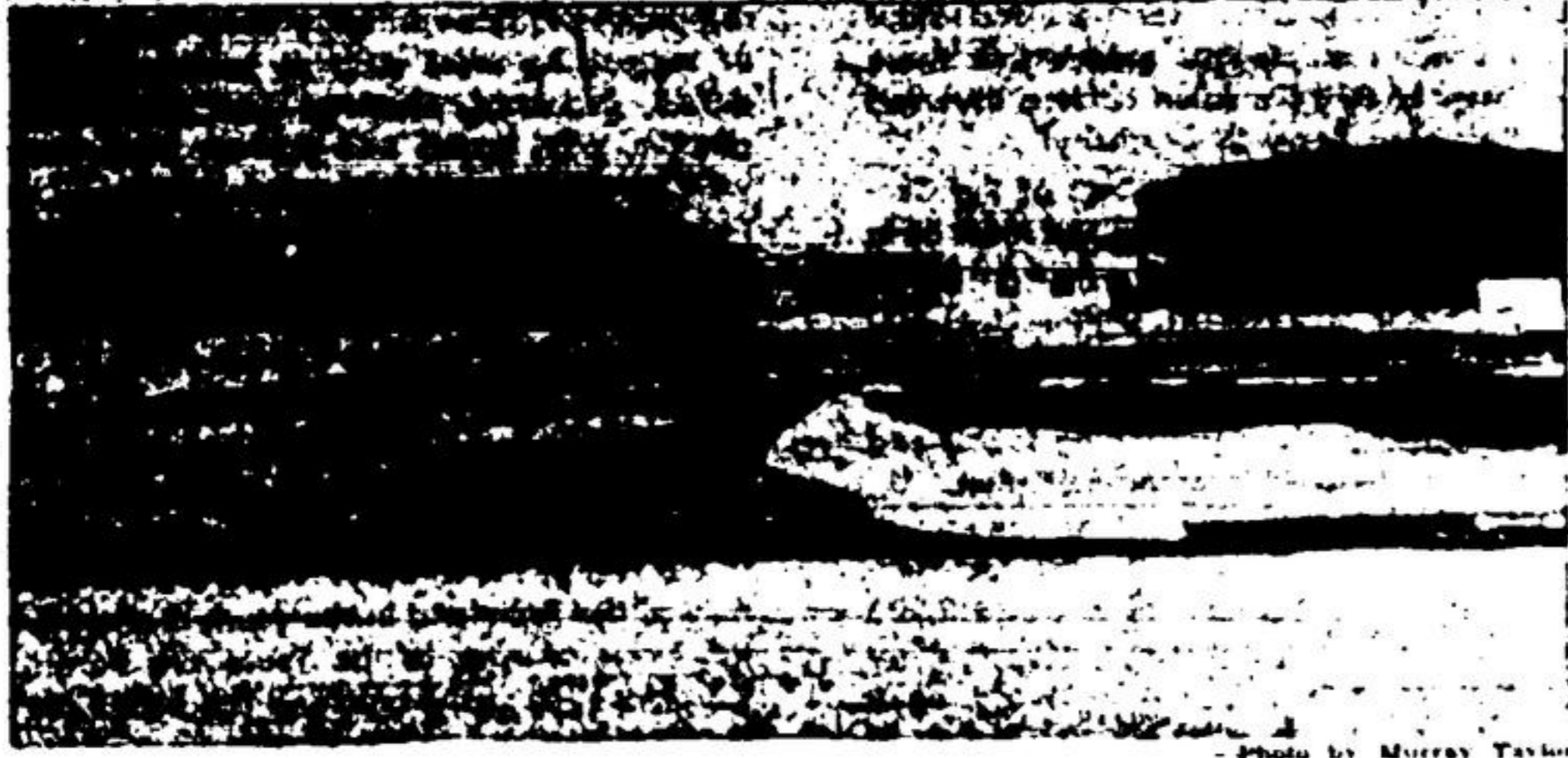


ROCKWOOD Local and District News

Liturgical Renewal Subject Of Talk at C.W.L. Meeting

Plan Bridge, Stream Diversion On Ninth Line, Glen Williams

A new \$96,000 bridge and \$11,000 stream diversion at Glen Williams has been included in the Halton County roads budget approved by County Council on Tuesday.

The 100 foot span bridge of steel and concrete will provide a 30 foot road surface plus sidewalk. The stream will be diverted northeast from the present course close to the Ninth Line.

Agriculture is Major Subject In New Four-Year Trades Course

In September, a new blueprint for agriculture will be presented to the schools of Ontario. For the first time, students will be able to take agriculture as the major subject in the Four-Year Science, Technology and Trades Program and qualify for a Secondary School Graduation Diploma at the end of Grade 12 with the designation of "Agriculture".

The announcement of the new policy was made by the Hon. William G. Davis, Minister of Education, in a speech officially opening an addition to the Ferris High School on March 10.

Mr. Davis said, "The new program will place emphasis on the practical and business courses useful to a boy who is planning to remain on the farm. It will include, in an expanded form, the science-based course in agriculture introduced in 1962. The new Four-Year Agriculture Program is tailored to meet the needs of the students who plan

to return to the farm and the new diploma will provide an incentive for more pupils to remain in school to the end of Grade 12." The five-year course, which included agriculture as an option, will continue to be the preparatory course for the Ontario Agricultural College.

Over \$400,000 worth of material, medical and technical assistance, was provided for 43 countries by the Canadian Red Cross last year.

Review Lorne Scots Activities Most Efficient Unit in Canada

Col. J.-M. Barber and Major Bob Hardy reviewed the activities of the Lorne Scots regiment during the past year, when they addressed the Halton County Council on Monday.

Major Hardy reviewed the regiment had won the Lorne Scots trophy as the most efficient unit in Canada. Among other accomplishments were the Ontario trophy by the rifle team.

No Reduction The regiment is now the largest infantry unit west of Rimouski,

Quebec and although Armories at Milton, Port Credit and Orangeville have been closed no reduction in strength is anticipated. The Lorne Scots regiment is authorized to recruit up to 400 while other units are limited to 200. Plans for celebration of the unit's centennial in 1966 are being formulated including a reunion, parades and a formal trooping of the colors.
