Own Industrial Park

The clerk advised council that the final settlement in the purchase of the Hulnagel property, Main St. N., for an industrial park had been completed that day. Council now owns outright and can proceed to sell the land for industrial purposes.

It was decided that the cost of installing the telephone in the town superintendent's truck would be too expensive for the benefits derived.

Accounts totalling \$7,672 of the third financial statement were passed for payment.

Aldo Braida, chairman of the Acton planning board, attended the meeting to explain to the budget committee the planning board budget submitted. Mr. Braida outlined the work to be undertaken in this and future years.

All members of council were present for the marathon session which adjourned after midnight.

Smash, Grab Thieves At Service Station

Smash and grab thieves broke a plate glass window on the front door of Jack McCallum's Texaco service station yesterday night of last week and escaped with only few packages of cigarettes.

The break - in was discovered by Constable Bruce Kressler of the Acton O.P.P. when on patrol around 5 a.m. Friday morning. It is believed that the hurried trip was made on account of the well illuminated area around the garage.

Friday Fire

Acton firefighters had a chilly ride on the back of the fire truck Friday morning when they answered a call at the home of D. Ransom, on No. 7 Highway between the sixth and seventh lines.

By the time the truck arrived, a space heater fire had been brought under control by the homeowner.

Set 5.75 Halton Tax Rate Acton's Share is \$41,693

Halton County Council Tuesday budgeted for expenditures of \$1,474,865 for its general operations and \$1,215,544 for road purposes, when it approved the 1965 county budget. The rate of 5.75 mills remains unchanged from the previous year.

Major expenditures in the county budget are \$570,050 for debt charges and repayment; \$259,400 for public welfare; \$10,400 for protection to persons and property; and \$193,397 for

general government.

Main source of revenue, other than taxation, is in grants and subsidies from the federal and provincial governments making up the general budget.

The 5.75 mills is made up of 4.1 for the general levy and 1.65 for the roads.

Road expenditures in the county will total an estimated \$1,215,544. Of this total the county levy of 1.65 mills will raise \$452,420, both the balance coming from the

Department of Highways and a surplus from 1964 of \$93,483.

Oakville will contribute the largest amount to the county with its levy making up \$409,473; Burlington next with \$161,374; Georgetown will pay \$101,204; Essex \$57,698; Milton \$51,599; Acton \$41,693; and Nasagawaya \$24,573.

In addition to the general and road rates, the north Halton municipalities pay special levies to Oakville's big Cities Service refinery.

Three weeks ago, wheat brought \$155 on the market here. Today, only \$120 is offered.

Eramosa Township has lost its third Reeve in five months. William Parkinson, who was elected March 1 to succeed the late Reeve Black, died very suddenly on Tuesday. Reeve McNabb died in October and James Black was elected to fill the vacancy, and again in January, and he passed away on February 6.

The Ladies' Aid social in the Methodist church school room was a very successful affair. The main item of the evening was an address by Rev. G. W. Baker of Guelph. Other excellent numbers were solo by Miss Pearl Baker, Miss Lily Alderson and Master Frank Clark, readings by Mrs. A. T. Brown, and organola selections.

The pavements will soon be free of ice again. There have been more slippery walks than usual this past winter. Spring commences next Sunday according to the almanac.
