### Split in League Issue at Meeting

The possible splitting of the Tri-County Hockey Association into two divisions for play in the 1965-66 season will be the major issue on Sunday afternoon when representatives from the 10 member towns gather in Milton for the annual general meeting of the association.

A proposal from Brampton that the league split into two divisions, "A" and "B," "C" and "D" divisions in a second division, will be greeted coolly by Milton representatives and possibly by other towns.

The reason for the proposed split is that some of the larger towns, Brampton, Oakville, Burlington and Guelph, gain very little from continually beating some of the weaker entries by top-sided scores. Their suggestion would have Georgetown, Guelph, Preston, Brampton, Oakville and Burlington competing in one division while Milton,ergus, Acton, Orangeville and Hespeler would battle for a "B" division crown.

Officials from Milton have already registered their dislike for the proposal, reasoning that they can compete on equal terms with the "A" teams and stating that they would prefer to play in the "still" competition. Several other communities have also suggested they will support Milton.

The election of an association executive for the 1965-66 season will also be on the agenda. Bob Patterson of Brampton, president for the past two years, intends to resign his post and Arnold McDuffie of Milton, first vice-president, has been suggested as the likely successor. Other positions to be filled at the meeting include first, second and third vice-president, secretary and treasurer.
