

# Lt. Col. Hardie Assumes Command Of Lorne Scots Regiment April 4

A new page in the history of the Lorne Scots (Peel, Dufferin and Halton Regiment) begins April 4 when Lt. Col. E. F. Conover, C.D., relinquishes his command as commanding officer and Lt. Col. R. G. Hardie, C.D., assumes command of the Regiment.

The change of command ceremony will take place on April 4, at 2 p.m. in the sports hall at the

of the Lorne Scots since 1938, is a veteran of the Second World War. He went overseas with the regiment in 1941 and returned to Canada as a sergeant in 1943 to receive his officer training and was commissioned. He returned to England in late 1943 and was transferred to the Essex Scottish with whom he saw action in North-West Europe as part of the 2nd Canadian Division. Lt. Col. Hardie was severely wounded overseas and invalided home in 1944, after a year in hospitals, he was discharged in 1945.

Lt. Col. Hardie joined the Lorne Scots (infantry) in April 1951 and during the recent years he served as Adjutant, Training Officer and Commanding Officer of "A" Coy located in Lakeside. In October of 1961 he was promoted to Second in Command. In addition to his duties as Second in Command, he also served as Aide de Camp to Lt. Gov. Keiller McKay and Lt. Gov. Earl Rowe.

Lt. Col. R. G. Hardie lives in Linton with his wife Mary and their three children, Jim 19, Cathy 17, and Peter 12.

## C.O.B.A. Meet at Ligny School

H. Craig Reid of R.R. 6 Milton was chairman for the Halton Unit meeting of the Central Ontario Breeders' Association, at Ligny School.

The Central Ontario unit will be celebrating its 20th Anniversary of Artificial Insemination, June 4. The membership has increased from 98 in 1945 to a present membership of 19,030. The Halton area, which consists of all of Halton County and the Township of Erin, and a part of Eramosa, has 1,418. Fifty five percent of the cattle in this area are bred artificially.

Wilfred McKim of Orangeville, president of the C.O.B.A. discussed the Beef Sire Proving Policy, and stated that four of the six Quality Meat Sires in Ontario are in this Unit. To become a Quality Meat Sire, ten or more steers sired by the bull must meet certain qualifications when slaughtered. These are: weight for age, area of ribeye, fat thickness, and marbling.

Duncan Moffat, R.R. 2 Rockwood discussed the "Dairy Sire Proving Policy".
