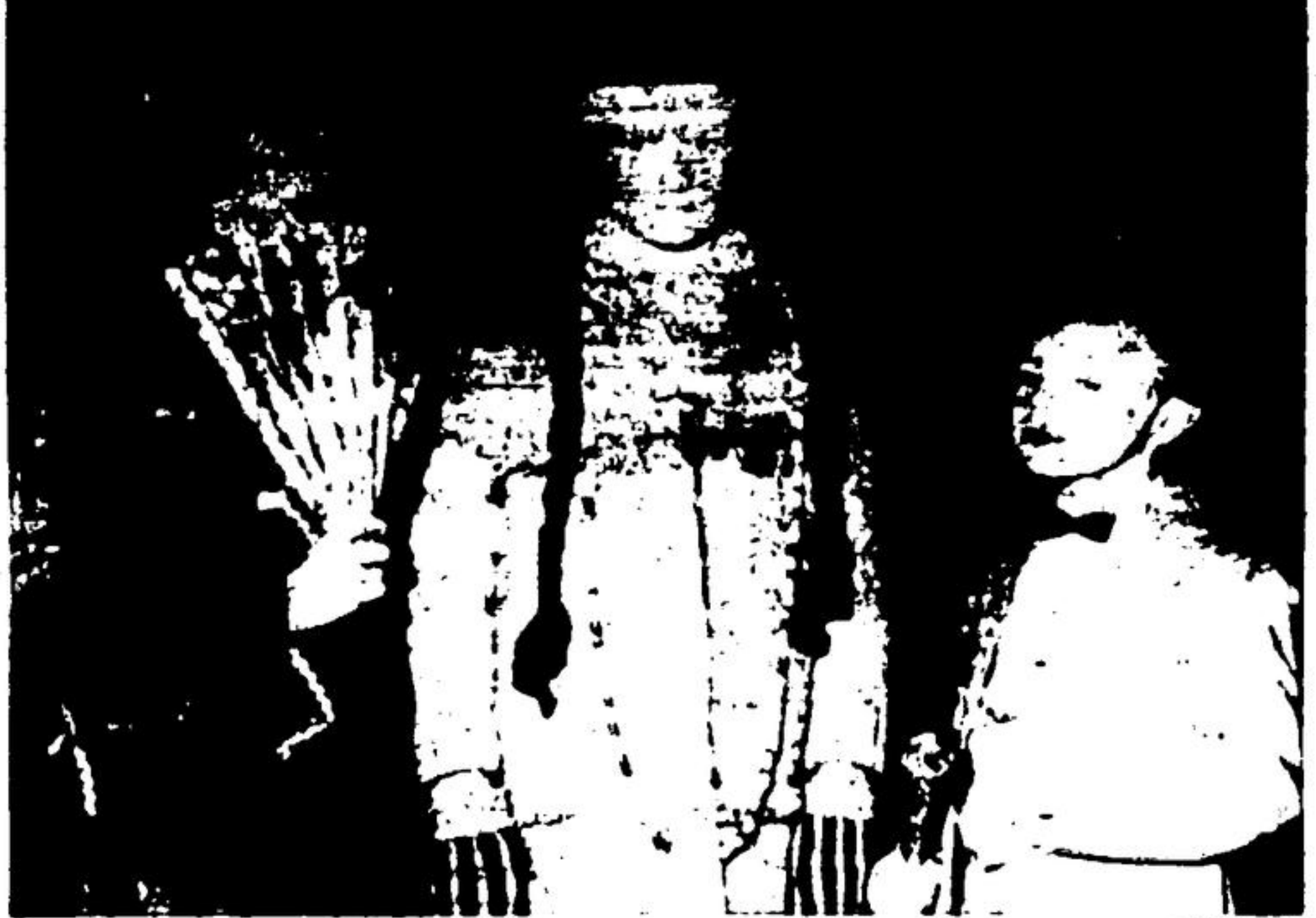
Ladies' Aid Hostess Mrs. J. Van Fleet

Advice to Farmers

Basic Herd Reduces Tax

Every year farmers give hundreds of dollars to the Government in the form of taxes which they need not have paid. Setting up a Basic Herd would keep a lot of money at home, but many farmers seem to prefer paying Income Tax when the herd is sold.

Hardly a winter month goes by without the newspapers reporting on a barn fire. Often the report fully covered by Insurance. The report never says how much Income Tax was paid by the farmer on livestock lost in the fire and paid out of the insurance.

Farmers filing Income Tax returns on a cash basis could find themselves paying a high rate of tax in one year on compensation from disease or fire proceeds from a dispersal sale, the value of gifts (or bequests in will), or any other large reduction of the breeding herd. The establishment of a Basic Herd will not eliminate all Income Tax payable, but will reduce the amount paid by spreading the taxable income over more years.

A Basic Herd can be set up for mature breeding animals either of all of sheep, hogs, beef and dairy cattle. One farm can have several Basic Herds. The important thing is to get a Basic Herd started, and then keep adding to it as the farm grows.

Farmers who have been in business since January 1, 1947 should apply to have their Basic Herds set up for that date. The Health of Animals Branch, Canada Department of Agriculture, is a useful source for proving ownership of animals, but this branch only records for the last 10 years. Breed Societies and Veterinary Offices are other useful sources.

For those who have started farming since 1947, the same sources of proof of ownership can be used when applying for a Basic Herd.

Young men starting farming today can establish a Basic Herd if they start on their own or with their fathers. Even when a partnership is established between father and son, the son can and should start a Basic Herd of his own.

It is easy to get started on a Basic Herd, providing you have been filing your Income Tax. Just write or call the district Taxation Office, Hamilton, or ask for Form T-2019, the Basic Herd Application Form. Why not ask for some T-2019A forms — Applications to

Increase Basic Herd — at the same time?

Further help in getting started on the road to a Basic Herd can be received by contacting the Agricultural Office, Milton. Many farmers prefer to wait and pay higher Income Taxes. Why not keep that money at home by setting up a Basic Herd now?
