Rockwood Lowers Mill Rate Has New Eramosa Agreement

Rockwood — Scenic Rockwood has done the unexpected — they have lowered their mill rate. This was done at their March meeting at the Rockwood Town Hall recently.

After passing village accounts of \$938.52, and for Roads \$608.17, the Village Trustees got down to the serious task of operating on the proposed budget for 1965. They made a few changes and came up with a budget that permits a decrease in the Village mill rate of 4 mills on residential and 5 mills on commercial. Rockwood assessment is up 9,200 over 1964. With the budget now in progress it will be up again next year.

Mr. Braida reviewed the history of 4-H in this area and commended previous clubs on their excellent team spirit which had resulted in enviable competition records. He expressed the leaders' confidence that the new members would make every effort to maintain the high standards set by former clubs.

In introducing a new club leader, Russell Murray, Mr. Braida reviewed Russell's record during his eight years as a 4-H member and stated his long and valuable experience made him eminently-qualified to lead young people.

Special Events

Doug McDonnell, Halton Assistant Agricultural Representative was introduced and he outlined 4-H program in Halton County in 1965 and pointed out that projects available to local members include, calf, grain, conservation and engineering. Other events aside from regular meetings would be a safety rally grain judging competition in Milton, a joint practice session in livestock judging in preparation for the four county bus trip, and the inter-club judging in October and finally awards night in December.

Awards available to high scoring members are trophies for winners of individual clubs, a plaque for high novice at Guelph, and the J. E. Whitlock Memorial trophy to the outstanding member in Halton County. The highest honor in 4-H is to be chosen a delegate to National 4-H Week during the Royal Winter Fair.
