View Clean, Modern Dairy Farms On Holstein Breeders Bus Trip

Fifty Holstein Breeders visited outstanding herds in Oxford, Elgin and Middlesex Counties on Friday, April 2. The first visit was to the Rowedale Farm, Currie, owned by Mr. Row, president of the Holstein-Friesian Association of Canada. Mr. Row has a conventional dairy barn, with a pole barn for the young cattle. Hay is handled with a forage harvester and barn dried.

At the farm of Fred Colson, Burgessville, comfort stalls were observed. Cattle feed on haylage from a Lutz Susan around the base of the large silo. The cows are confined to the barn area throughout the entire year.

At Forest Lee Farms, Springfield, the five "Excellent" cows were inspected. One of these has now completed over 200,000 pounds of milk.

A modern windowless dairy barn was seen at the farm of Martin Bros., St. Thomas. The 50 Holsteins are tied up, but are milked in a milking parlour. A glass lin-

ed silo has been erected, along with a cement silo for feeding haylage and corn silage. High moisture corn is also included in the dairy ration.

The final visit was to the farm of Weaver Bros., Belton. The five "Excellent" cows were also seen in this herd.

By going on group bus trips, farmers can observe new trends in breeding, feeding and management of dairy cattle.
