MEMORIES OF A SERIES which is still being touted in O.H.A. circles as a good example of the old saw "Don't count your chickens bridge; Waterloo 2 Oakville 1 Others thought the Durham club ... " were raised by the current Durham-Acton hockey final. Just for the record, this tuzzy faced one dipped back into the files of 1936 for more information on what undoubtedly was the biggest disappointment Acton bockey fans ever suffered. It, too was between Durham and Acton in the OHA Intermediate 'B' semi-finals.

Do you remember? Or were you like this scribbler, a gangly starry-eyed voungster when it all occurred, most of whose information came from snatches of conversation dropped by the elders of the time.

Back in 1936 this town had a hockey club that went 19 straight Dunnville 1 sames without a deleat. They easily won the group from Oakville and Pergus. They went into the O.H.A. Int. B. playdowns, knocked off Paris in the first round and met Durham in the semi-finals in a total goal two game series.

First game of the semi-finals was in Galt where the Tanners Flyers Square Series played their home games due to the incertainty of natural ice in Acton. It was hardly a contest. 


