Outario poultry producers have voted in favor of a proposed Ostario Broller Chicken Marketing Plan, the Ontario Farm Products Marketing Desert samuument today

With 744 producers casting ballots, 632 or 64.9 per cent vol ed in favor of the plan, with 166 or 14.6 per cent being opposed. Some 1,978 producers were eligible to vote.

Heaviest vote was in Lincoln County where 182 ballots were cast with 95 producers in favor and seven against. Waterloo County with 45 voters favored the proposed plan by 57 to


