(Continued from Page One) closely neighbors E. G. Tyler Sr. and Eric Johnson in hopes of solving any differences privately.

Mr. Parker said he understood money had changed hands and was cautioned by councillor Artie to first get his dates straight if Mr. Johnson was a member of council at the time the incident supposedly took place before any conflict of interest could be claimed.

"I am not accusing the man," only repeating what I heard," stated Mr. Parker.

Councillor Artie said he was almost convinced the time when the councillor paid money he was not a member of council and there was no conflict.

Should Be Advised Mayor Lee Dubs informed the four ratepayers all council meetings were open to the public but if any delegations appeared to be heard they must first be placed on the agenda. He told the men they were being heard at council's discretion and since other parties involved were not present a half would have to be called.

Mr. Artie explained it was not council's intention to pass the subject over. Clerk McGeachie wondered if council would like to call a public meeting at which time everything could be aired.

Incense, Planter Promised Dick Lee in a few words to council shed more light on the subject as far as the ratepayers were concerned when he noted that there seemed to be a lack of evidence given to ratepayers regarding the manner in which the company intended to improve the corner of property under question. He was told by the clerk a letter on file from the company promised a fence and planter strip around the property if the zoning was allowed. (This was previously reported in council news.)

Councillor Artie, speaking as a ratepayer, reminded the delegates he lived close to the Ajax plant and his home was located so he looked into the Ajax yard. "I would be the last one to suggest that the piles of lumber to look at would ever look like a rose garden but I feel it will be cleaned up considerably."

He also told Mr. Lee, who is manager of the Thermoid Division of Diston, that if Ajax moved out another industry could locate there similar to the Thermoid plant and residents would not only have piles of lumber to look at but the odor to contend with as well. "I have smelled your brake linings until it made me sick to my stomach."

Set Date Before the delegates departed, they were assured a resolution would be sponsored to hold a public meeting. Later in the meeting this was done and a public meeting open to civic ratepayer in town will be held in the council chamber Thursday May 13 at 7:30 p.m.

Investigate Buying Another Fire Truck

Number two committee of council which includes the fire committee is presently investigating purchase of a new fire truck. It is anticipated a percentage of the cost will be covered by grants.

During the committee report Tuesday it was learned a piece of property had been purchased by the town to accommodate the new wigway signal scheduled for the Mill St. C.N.R. crossing prior to highway widening.

Following a letter from the North Halton Association for the Mentally Retarded, council will postpone the week of May 9 to May 16 as "Flowers of Hope Week."

Department of Transport officials will be asked to review the Eastern Avenue R.R. crossing in order to recommend a plan for altering the road.

Council amended the town employees' agreement with the following resolution which was approved unanimously:

"That we pay Time and a half after 9 hours per day or 45 hours per week (days off sick do not count in the 45 hour week).

"A guarantee of two hour pay for off scheduled work shall be paid on the regular daily or weekly schedule (Monday to Friday Time and a half after 9 hours daily, Saturday and Sunday Time and a half after 45 hours for the week).

The ten cents differential is paid assuming that the men paid are on call over the Saturday and Sunday and they are expected to be available within 30 minutes of being called. This section shall be considered further by the Committee."

Halton M.P. Attends Geneva Conference Halton's Liberal Member of Parliament, Dr. Harry C. Harles, has been named a Canadian delegate to the World Health Organization Conference in Switzerland next week.

Dr. Harles has served as the chairman of the government's special Food and Drug Committee for two years and he and the Hon. Judy Le Marchand and Food and Drug Directorate officials are attending the world conference. He leaves Saturday and will stay at Geneva, Switzerland for the three-week conference. Workshop sessions on drug safety are included in the conference and Dr. Harles said he was especially interested in this area as his special committee has been dealing with drug safety for several months.

Questioned by Milton's Rev. C. A. Martin on whether this would eliminate the necessity of fluoride in the drinking water, Dr. Hill suggested the fluoride in the water gave further protection and the two together would present a great deal of safety.

Even Teeth The value of the application to the second teeth was that they come in in better position, making possible more effective self-cleaning from the even chewing action.

Dr. Hill noted the \$1,500 required from the county, which would be augmented by provincial grants, was a minor cost in view of the benefits. The amount had been included in the Unit's budget.

Mrs. Allan Moore opened her home for the Women's Association quilting held on Monday and Tuesday for St. David's Presbyterian church.

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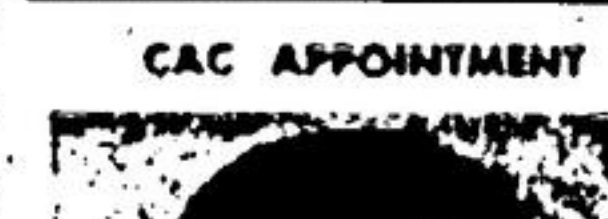
SCHOOL FEES

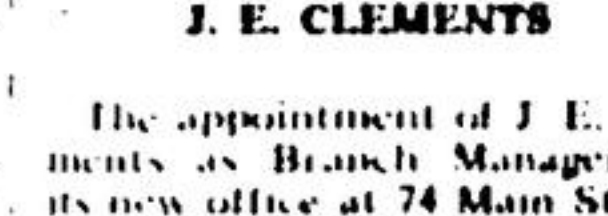


J. E. CLEMENTS
