Vice-Chairman chosen at the March 30 meeting in Toronto, was J. L. Chisholm, Guinness breeder, of R.R. 3, Milton.

To complete the "Honor Roll" of the board, the immediate Past President is J. W. Willmott, R.R. 1, Milton.

In his chairman's address, Joe Willmott reported that 6,553 purebreds had been exported to 11 countries last year, while 4,171 animals had been imported. All livestock, with the exception of Holsteins, are registered through the Canadian National Livestock Records, Ottawa.

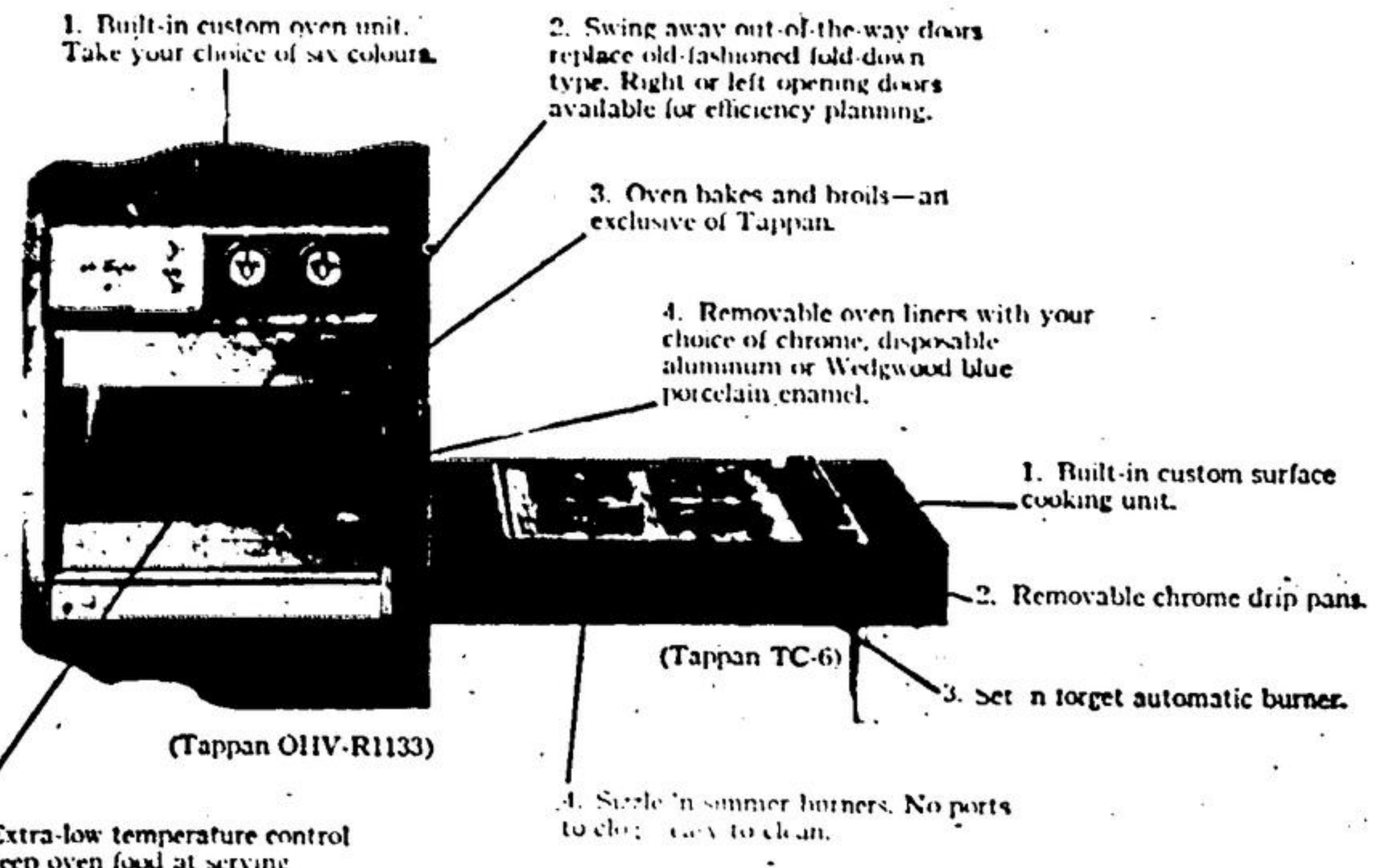

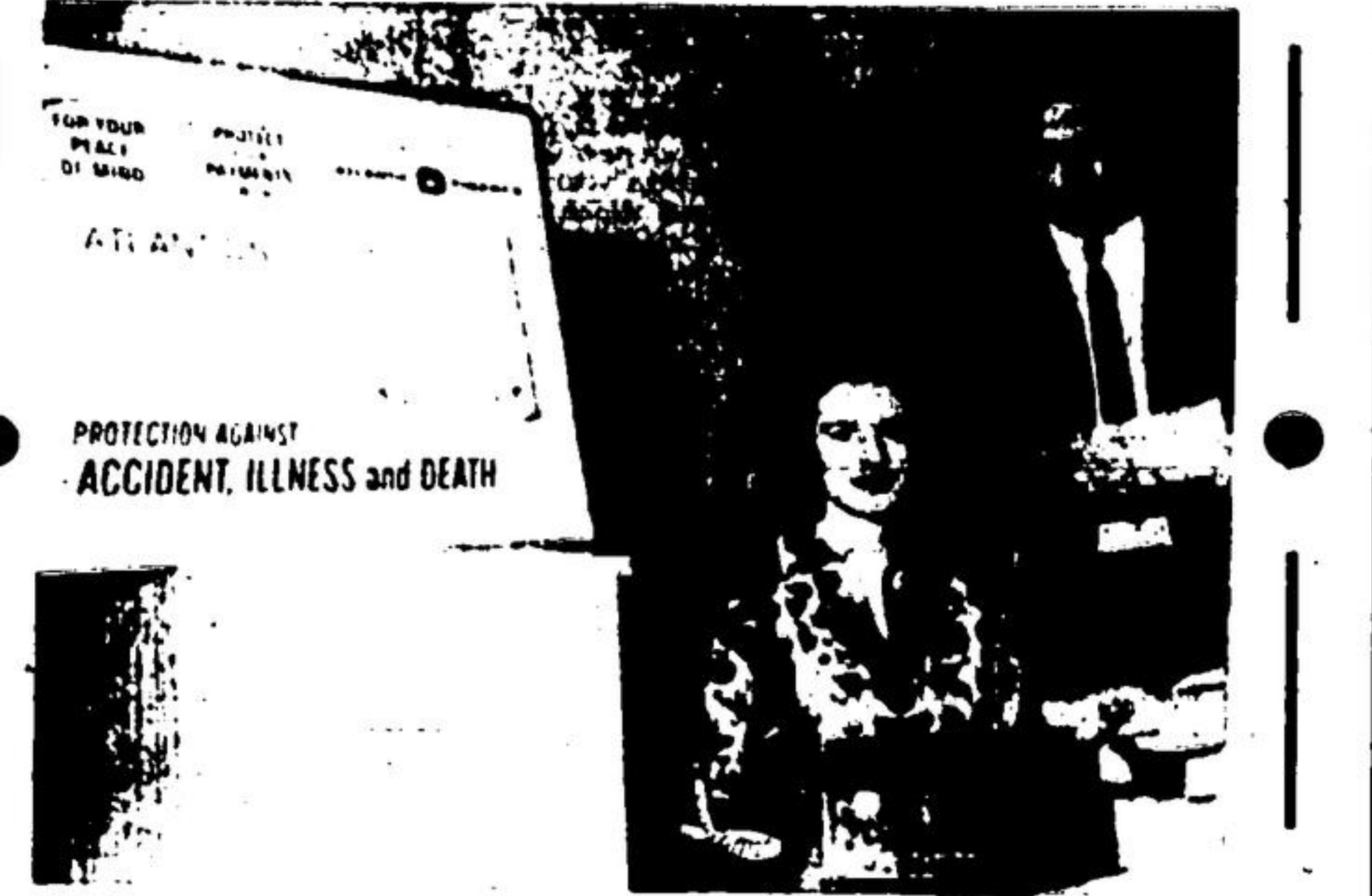
