Need More Registrations

To Launch German Language School

For several months a German language school, for both children and adults, has been investigated by executive members of the German-Canadian Club of Halton County. At an executive meeting last Wednesday evening in Milton, it was announced the idea is a definite possibility if enough registrations are received.

The school would operate for two-hour lessons on Saturdays, in a rented class room in the J. M. Dennes School in Milton, if 35 children can be enrolled between now and the end of June. And if there is sufficient interest from adults, a course in the German language can also be established for adults wishing to learn a second tongue.

Just Need 11

Establishment of the Saturday school is virtually established, new president Fritz Schicht of Milton announced at Wednesday's meeting, as to date 24 children have been tentatively enrolled. Another 11 will be enough to

pay the expenses of renting the classroom and paying the teacher.

Financial assistance will also be available from both the Canadian and German governments. Investigations have shown, K. Heeb, of the Federal German Language School Board and a representative of the Trans-Canada Alliance of German-Canadians, has promised to attend a public meeting here near the end of June to explain the operation of the school to interested parents.

The directors have advertised for qualified teachers and several excellent replies have been received. After the public meeting the applicants will be interviewed for the position. One of the applicants was a man who spoke four languages and offered to teach French and Spanish as well, if there is a need for it.

The school would begin next September and executive members said board of parents would have to be set up to administer

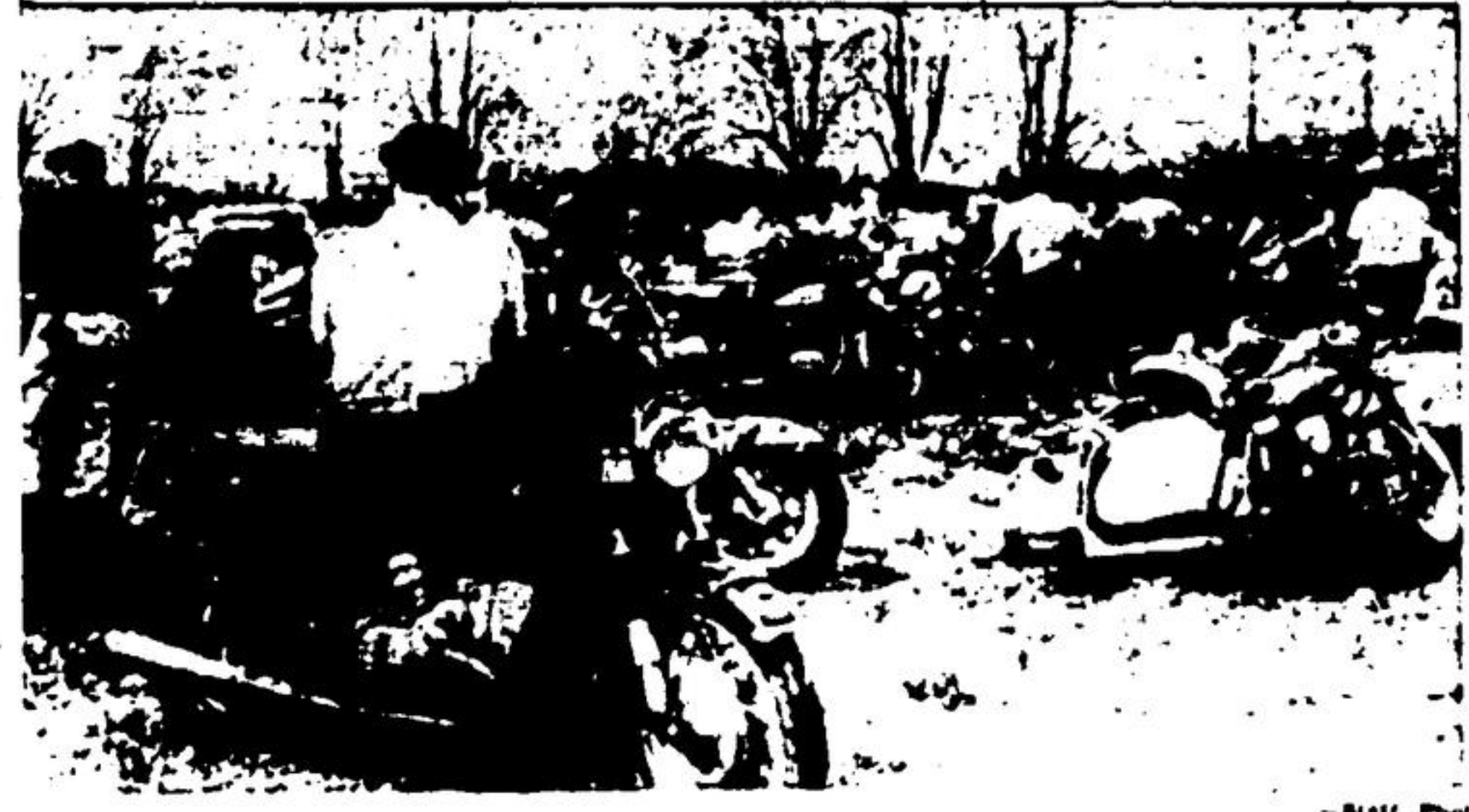

FAME Inquiry in Milton To Hear Many Witnesses

A Royal Commission Inquiry into the past financial affairs of FAME—Farmers' Allied Meat Enterprises—is being held in the Halton County Court House in Milton all this week with Mr. Justice Campbell Grant presiding.

The hearing of witnesses is expected to last all week, then be adjourned until after the May 24 holiday weekend. Dozens of witnesses are to be called.

The farmers' cooperative received investments from about 13,000 farmers after it was formed in 1960 to build a chain of seven meat packing plants for the processing of livestock. Last fall FAME directors decided to purchase the J. W. Feenan plant at Burlington and made a substantial down payment, but a \$100,000 payment due a month later could not be met. The original owner took over the plant, and the down payment was lost.

FAME directors asked for a provincial body to look into their problems several months ago.

Usher in Summer Season Post Gatemen at Kelso

The summer season at Kelso Conservation Area near Milton will be officially ushered in this weekend—gatemen will be posted to charge an admission price for the first time this weekend.

The area has been open to the public all year and it has been a busy spot for fishermen on recent May weekends. During the winter one section of the conservation parksite was busy with skiers who enjoyed the tricky slopes of Glen Eden Ski Club, and the museum has been open during the winter months and hosted thousands of visitors.

Lot of Work

Conservation officials said this week there is a lot of work to be done before the Kelso area will be "in shape" for the summer visitors expected. Roads need repaving and some bank erosion through the winter months is to be repaired.

The swimming pool bottom is to be repaired, a well is being dug near it, and to date no official opening date has been decided for the pool area.

The Halton Region Conservation Authority will institute a \$2,000 tree planting program at Kelso this summer, using a mixture of trees up to 15 feet high. The nursery is being arranged by Authority member Jim Redman, an official of the Royal Botanical Gardens.

Restrict Swimming

Swimming in Glen Eden Lake will be restricted to the west end of the 80-acre lake, field officer Dave Murray reports. No swimming will be allowed near the dam or spillway, where one child was drowned and several near-drownings were reported last summer.

Anyone wishing to camp in the campsite section of Kelso is asked to seek permission from the Conservation Office on Main St. Group camping is allowed by permit and overnight campers should also apply before entering the park.

Authority members have discussed increasing the admission charges this year but no decision has been reached. The Authority is meeting later this week to lay plans for the summer season and it is expected a discussion on parking and swimming fees will be held then.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

LIME PEAR SALAD
Refreshing flavour for springtime meals
1 tin Canada Choice canned pears
1 pint cottage cheese
2 cups cole slaw
2 pgs. lime gelatin
1 cup chopped walnuts
(Serves average family)

Drain pears and set the juice aside. Fill centre of 6 pear halves with cottage cheese and sprinkle with chopped walnuts. Carefully place the filled pear halves face down in a loaf shape mould, arranging them neatly. Cover with layer of cottage cheese. In a separate bowl, dissolve one package of gelatin in one cup of hot liquid, using pear juice, with balance of water. Pour

gelatin into mould slowly, keeping the pear halves in place at bottom of mould. When slightly set, place the cole slaw in the mould and pour in the second package of dissolved gelatin (one cup of water) up to the rim of the mould. Chill thoroughly. Unmould and garnish with remaining pear halves filled with cottage cheese and walnuts.
