garden path. To change their minds is completely unfair."
Councillor Arbie wondered if public subscription failed, would the ratepayers, who had contributed, be hit again for a debenture issue to clear up the financial balance.

Mr. Arbie stated he wasn't against public subscription but would like to have proof of how this method would work and, if it didn't, wanted to know what would happen.

Mr. Drinkwater stated members of the centennial committee felt it was quite feasible to raise the money by public subscription.

Earlier, council had been told the debenture issue might mean a possible six or seven mills on the tax rate during the period of debenture. Reeve H. H. Hinton argued this was a false figure and the mills involved could easily be doubled.

"Proud with Pride"
Mayor Duby stated, "I admire the reeve's ability to distort the facts. I am opposed to this town running any risk and being tagged with stigma the same as the community centre when a seed and public subscription was necessary. The library should be completed before 1967 so we can point with pride." The mayor said he was opposed to public subscription and felt he was representing the majority of local ratepayers in making the statement.

Councillor Albert Irwin said he was confused regarding the amount of money to be raised as he had heard figures of from \$50,000 down to \$20,000. He also wondered what the public reaction would be if ratepayers contributed to public subscription and then were asked to support a debenture issue to complete the financing. "If they knew this would happen, they would be liable to turn down a chance to contribute voluntarily," he stressed.

Councillor Frank Oakes, who is also financial chairman, said a debenture issue wouldn't mean as much as one mill per year for a period of 10 years. Mrs. Ever said, "What's the difference if we pay a mill on taxes every year? We will never miss it."
The resolution to raise funds by debenture was lost during a vote of members with only the mayor and councillors Ever and Oakes in favor.

Haltom Towns Share \$2,872,000 From Ontario '65 Road Budget

Haltom County and its seven municipal councils will share in \$2,872,000 of the Ontario Department of Highways' \$121,350,000 set aside for municipal assistance in the 1965-66 fiscal year, it was announced last week when Minister of Highways C. S. McNaughton presented his estimates in the Legislature.

After the tour, the ladies journeyed out to the home of Mrs. M. McCulloch to continue on with their regular monthly meeting. Mrs. D. Matthews presided for the meeting and in the absence of the secretary, Mrs. J. C. Dennis presented the minutes of the previous meeting, and also the treasurer's report. The Ethel Brant Maturity essay contest was discussed, and it was thought advisable to have the trophies on display in each of the neighboring schools, as well as the local schools, for one week to create interest among the pupils, and it will later be displayed in Simpson's Sears window in town.

Mrs. D. Matthews and Mrs. M. McCulloch were named to meet with a committee from the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Sunshine School at Hornby to plan space and other details for the display of pupils' work at the Fair. A judge for the homecraft display has now been obtained. A glass showcase has been donated to the Ladies' Board, which will probably be used for exhibition of the different trophies.

Investigation from other fair boards as to price and other features will be made, and reports given later. Secretaries of local and district institutes and organizations will be notified about the parade on the second day of Acton Fall Fair, and are asked to cooperate as usual in making this a worthwhile feature of the Fair.
