## Objectors Hear Details On Ajax Application

A motion was subsequently passed by council: "This council, upon approval of the Marley Canadian Limited and the present owners, compile a list of pertinent information as discussed and read at a public hearing, held May 13, and send this list if approved to all rate payers who have filed objections, in order that the said rate payers who have filed objections as registered and that anyone wishing to reconsider and change previous thinking notify the clerk in writing on or before May 25 at 5 p.m. and be it further resolved that Mr. E. G. Tyler be requested to make available certain information to the clerk."

**Distribute Information**  
Eric Johnston felt that if some of the objectors had known about the planting strip, and the fact no access would be permitted from Mowbray Place "they wouldn't have signed." One couple is moving away.

Ted Tyler Sr. felt neighbors should see copies of Ajax proposals. In return, clerk McGeechie asked for a reciprocal copy of a zoning document. Tyler filed with the Department of Planning.

**Two Letters**  
In its two letters of explanation to the town, Ajax Engineers spelled out what would be provided (as reported in the letter to those who objected this week) and said, "We have tried to be as cooperative as possible. We feel we are in no way decreasing the value of anyone's property."

"Consider our history of cooperation with the community," a letter said, pointing out the property could be sold to more objectionable tenants if the plant was obliged to relocate, and expressing hope the objections would be withdrawn before the matter went to the O.M.B.

**Major Objection**  
Charlie Allen spoke of garbage being picked up by neighbors and his complaint was termed by Ray Abbie "a consistent and major objection." Sam Snow explained if the company had more room to operate, they could keep things tidier. "We have to move materials to get at what we require." Bill Coon briefly agreed.

E. A. Parker mentioned possible devaluation of property, proximity to the dump, rail roads, "and now a factory area." "Does council think this is justified?"

Answered Mayor Duby, "All three were there before the subdivision... we have tried our best."

Challenged Mrs. Fryer, "Do you realize the other side of the story? How many men will be out of work?"

Planning board felt there would be no devaluation of property, Mr. Goodwin explained.

### Cemetery Improvement

The "clean up" program at the cemetery is continuing this week. An area of bush land at the far end of the property is being bulldozed and cleared. Mansell Neil is the contractor. In the centre of the cemetery, swamp land is being filled in with earth dumped by Len Ariss workmen, who are widening the highway.
