Fourth Bazaar at Manor 327 Visitors from Area

There must be a special bond of friendship between the wealthier and the poorer, for the Manor on the one hand, and the Halton Manor on the other, for he provided a perfect day for the fourth annual bazaar of the Manor on Wednesday, May 12. The bazaar was held in the auditorium of the Manor under the auspices of the Halton Manor Auxiliary. The sunny, calm weather brought throngs of people to inspect and purchase the many articles for sale.

The register, which was looked after by Mrs. B. Lantz and Mrs. A. Agnew, showed a total of 327 names of visitors and residents. The auditorium presented a very attractive appearance and the decorations were especially admired. The stage and half of the floor space was given over to the serving of afternoon tea and the remainder of the floor space to the home-baking handicraft and novelty tables. The penny table had been set up in the anteroom.

Stage Decorations
A white picket fence and an archway decorated with evergreen boughs had been used to separate the two sections of the auditorium. Two large orange-colored lawn umbrellas with a tall green plant between them had been placed at the back of the stage. The front edge of the chapel and soft music, was of paper-mache flower containers holding chrysanthemums in various shades. The organ had been brought to the stage from the chapel and soft music played throughout the afternoon and evening.

The tables in the tea-room looked very dainty with their white luncheon cloths and individual pottery vases holding artificial flowers. The tea tables looked lovely with its extra lace cloth silver tea-servers and silver candlesticks. The refreshments were very attractive and delicious - assorted sandwiches, refreshments, small confections and tea.

The section of the auditorium given over to the sale of articles had its own special decorations this year. Lovely bouquets of roses, carnations and other fresh flowers had been placed on the sale tables. Hanging baskets filled with artificial flowers and pussy-willows had been suspended with colored ribbons from the ceiling beams.

Shortly after two o'clock, Mrs. S. Allen, president of the Halton Manor Auxiliary, extended a warm welcome to the many persons who had gathered and thanked the Auxiliary ladies for their many friends of the Manor, the staff members and the residents for their wonderful help in this undertaking. She then called on S. A. Allen, the superintendent of the Manor, who expressed words of welcome also.

Mr. Allen thanked all the organizations who have come through the years to present entertainment for the residents. Warden Herb Merry followed Mr. Allen and in a short, yet humorous speech expressed his pleasure in being able to attend. Mr. Allen then declared the Bazaar officially open.
