### Adjourn FAME Hearing Many Witnesses Heard

The lengthy Royal Commission Inquiry into the finances of FAME — Allied Meat Enterprises Co-Operative — adjourned Friday in the Halton County Court House, Milton. The hearings will resume next Tuesday, May 25, after presiding judge Mr. Justice Grant clears up some other commitments in other parts of Ontario.

During the first five days of evidence, the inquiry heard statements from Robert Carbert, former secretary-manager of the Ontario Federation of Agriculture; George Wilkey of Streetsville, secretary-treasurer of the Co-Op Union of Ontario Royal Commission; accountant John Newland; D Ritchie, treasurer of the F. W. Fearman meat packing plant, which FAME purchased and lost last year; E. R. Guener, the original Fearman owner who repurchased \$1,000,000 of Fearman shares after FAME defaulted on payments; Edward Walton, FAME's treasurer; Robert Mutch, superintendent of the Toronto division of the Toronto Dominion Bank; William Meek, assistant manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia in

Toronto; W. J. Whittaker and C. M. McKeown, FAME's Toronto lawyers; J. D. Miller, secretary of the Ontario Association of Architects; Thomas Bateman of the North American Life Insurance and Casualty Company, and Toronto architect F. R. Fisher.

The FAME cooperative had 14,000 members and planned to build a series of meat packing plants across Ontario. When the Burlington plant was up for sale, it was purchased by FAME with a \$1,500,000 down payment but the co-op was unable to meet a \$1,000,000

second payment and lost the plant by default.
