## High School

May 10 Terry Churchill's 423 triple paced the Crucifiers' 423 game roll of 2075, which gave them a lead of 94 pins over the second place Bewitched team Dave Lidka's 604 triple and Bob Price's 208-214 singles kept Bewitched in contention. Keeping building down third place after the first three games of the six game roll-off, came up with 1825 with Hill Fisher 621 and Ron Roe 218 singling. Shifters couldn't shift into high gear and trailed with a three game roll of 1714.

## High School Final

May 17 The final three games of the six game roll-off for the league championship ended in a big upset. Crucifiers, who had been a powerhouse all season were overwhelming favorites and with a 94 pin advantage from the first three games looked like a sure thing but "there's many a slip between the cup and the lip" and it happened. Crucifiers were off the beam in the first and checked in with 54 Bewitched, paced by "Red" Price's 215 made with a 653 and had a slight 27 pin overall advantage 2634 to 2609. Came the second game and Crucifiers picked up with a 207 headed by Terry Churchill's 214 but Bewitched were still going strong and sparked by Price's 251 and Dave Lidka's 231 came up with 761 to make it, Bewitched 3105, Crucifiers 3316 and Crucifiers were pushing the panic button but good.

Crucifiers gave it a go in the third and final game and although their 636 effort was better than the Bewitched 621 who hung in there with Price's 202, the final count was Bewitched 4016, Crucifiers 3952. Shifters who couldn't

find themselves in the first three games came up with games of 732-615-677 for 2024 and a total of 3738. Earl Butler with 204 and Wendy Almond with 261 turned in shifters best solos. Beatles' efforts of 587-519-516 for 1722 and a total of 3547 had them out of contention. Their one bright spot was Ron Roe's 231 single.

## Legion Ladies

May 10 Crickets are champs of the Legion Ladies' league going into the final three games of the six game playoff. Crickets were in third place, 226 pins behind Beatles. Crickets started off with a 734, to gain ground when Beatles posted 693. Beatles hit the fifth game with a 786, but Crickets still gained with an 831 going into the sixth and final game, the total pinfall stood for Beatles 3962, Crickets 3620. Rolling Stones 3704 and Munsters 3284.

That 142 pin lead that Beatles had looked good when they packed in a 740 roll, it looked as if they were in, but Crickets were chirping it up and rolled the best game of the series, a 957 — and they were in by 75 pins. Final total pinfall was Crickets 4477, Beatles 4702, Rolling Stones 4414 and Munsters 3980. So it's hail to the champs — Helen Joque, Verna McEachern, Vera Simmons, Pearl Cooke, Helen Grant and Mary Stamp. Individually on the night's roll, the best scores were singles with Phyllis Appell 215, Louise Toth 200, Joyce Buchanan 207, Helen Joque 245 and Mary Stamp 205.

## Industrial-Commercial

May 12 It was Orfium all the way for the Commercial-Industrial league championship when they met Ledger's IGA in the five game final, total pins to count Orfium were never headed in their quest for the championship. They established an early lead with games of 1201-1202-1129-1099-1074 for 5005. Ledger's sent for 1063-1068-1064-1127-989 for their total of 5311.

Orfium made it with the scores of Bob Agnew 1281 (345), (51), Jeff Fryer 953 (4), Dennis Crooks 613 (3), Denis Gibbons 411 (2), Fred Kentner 523 (3), Hank Earle 905 (4) and Leo McGillo 929 (4). For Ledger's scores it was Phil LeSueur 864 (4), Ed Parent 554 (3), "Minute" Wal-

ters 861 (5), Jim Billough 1049 (5), Bill Shannon 1179 (5), Martin Gehrich 863 (4). With the reliable "Pant" Ma you still adhered with a covered tendon in his bowling finger the Ledger's bowling strength was weakened and while this is not to take any credit away from Orfium's win it didn't help the IGA cause.

The Darts checked in with 867, headed up by Marion Stone's 206 and Donna Manes' 220 and the total three game pinfall of 2679 took care of Ledger's 2572. So congratulations are in order to the champs — Marion Stone, Lisa Swift, Donna Manes, Grace Robinson, Mary Papillon and Helen Holmes.

## Acton Mixed

May 11 Flukes belted their name by steering a comeback in the final three games of the six game roll-off pins to count. To start the last three games the standing was Lucky Strikes 2653, Wizards 2607, Flukes 2527, Beatles 2520, Fantastic Seven 2470 and Bees 2389. Wizards started off with an 836 and took command with 2443. Flukes announced their intentions of being in contention with an 824 for a pinfall of 3350. Lucky Strikes 674 saw them with 3327. Fantastic Seven came up with 872 for a total of 3342.

Flukes took over in the fifth with 896 for 4346 and Fantastic Seven moved up into second place with 857 for 4199. Wizards dropped off the pace with 702 for 4145. Beatles' 852 effort brought them up to 4105. Lucky Strikes rallied a bit with 756 for 4083. In the sixth and final game it was Flukes coming up with the best game of the play off — 1015 for a total of 5251. This sunk the opposition but good Fantastic Seven had a total of 5099. Wizards 5093, Beatles 4869, Bees 4692 and the short handed Lucky Strikes 4666.

May 15 Well, the Teen-N-Under playoff is over and it was the Bob Turkoz coached Hawks who flew away with the championship. To start the second set of two games, Hawks were in third place with a pinfall of 1516. Beatles being first with 1540 and Rolling Stones second with 1528. Eagles were flustering around in fourth place with 1489.

Hawks soared into first place after the opening game with a 745, paced by "Turk" 262. Beatles were up with 2261. Beatles were slightly crushed with a 616 for 2156 with Rolling Stones rolling along with 684 for 2212. Eagles were flustering with 640 for 2129. "Turk" set his team up again with a 235 and a team score of 230 for the four game total of 3000. Rolling Stones were giving it a pool go but their 774 game for a 2966 left them just 14 pins shy of winning. Eagles' game of 682 for 2811 and Beatles 632 for 2788 gave them the third and fourth spots respectively.

# Halton Farm Safety Council Select New Safety Projects

Fire extinguishers and the new Slow Moving Vehicle Signs are to be the projects of the Halton Farm Safety Council. The Council met in the Agricultural Office, Milton, on Monday evening, May 10th.

It was thought that many homes throughout the County, both rural and urban, were not adequately supplied with fire extinguishers. Thus the Safety Council in cooperation with the Halton Junior Farmers will be selling one and a half and two and a half pound dry chemical fire extinguishers. This type of extinguisher is suitable for all types of fires.

The new triangular red and orange Slow Moving Vehicle signs to be placed on the rear of vehicles travelling on roads. It will also be available in the near fu-

ture from Safety Council, Junior Farmers and at the Agricultural Office.

It was decided to invite representatives from the eight County in this area to Milton for the Fall Safety Rally in October. Mrs. A. R. Coulter, president of the Halton Farm Safety Council, is a Director from this Zone and is on the Ontario Farm Safety Council.

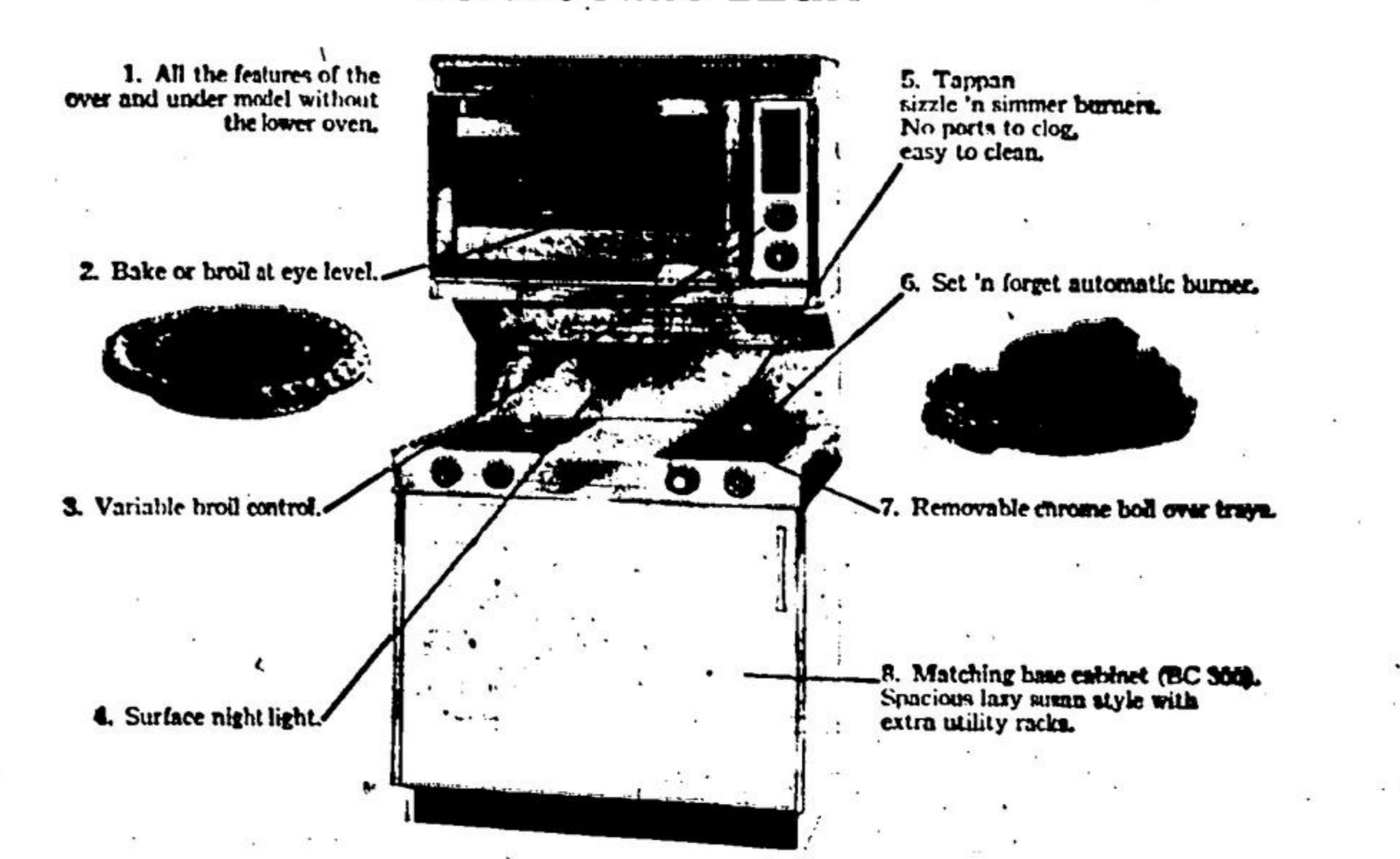
