

Arrest Three Youths Following Break-In

Acton G.P.P. Detachment solved the Acton liquor store robbery within 63 hours after the building had been broken into and \$150 worth of liquor was taken.

Constable Marvin Harwood, on patrol after midnight Saturday, checked at the liquor store around 11:30 a.m. and found everything in order. On a return trip an hour later, he noticed the front plate glass door smashed in and broken bottles lying inside on the floor.

Store manager George Sargent of Glen Williams was called and a thorough check of the building made. The check revealed a case of vodka, case of rye and 14 individual bottles of rye had been taken. Two had been broken inside the store and one outside.

Footprints, noticeable in front of the rear of the building, led to the C.N.R. tracks, where police found a full bottle of liquor had been dropped. Corporal Ray Mason and constables Harwood and Nick Farina took three youths into custody Tuesday.

Two local high school students were charged with break, entry and theft and one who recently quit school with possession of stolen goods.

The three youths appeared in Milton criminal court before Magistrate Black Wednesday morning and were remanded on their own recognizance until June 21, when they appear again.

COUNTY OF HALTON WEED CONTROL NEWS

CHEMICAL WEED-SPRAYING POPULAR
These are the days when we are apt to smell 2, 4-D in the air. Each year, more and more people are turning to chemicals to control their weeds. This is a very good trend, since it saves much time and labor down on your knees weeding, pulling or what have you.

For example, the spring dandelions are easily controlled with 2, 4-D Amine. Chickweed, Black Medic and other lawn weeds that are resistant to 2, 4-D can be controlled satisfactorily with products such as Silvex, Mecoprop (M.C.P.P.). For crabgrass, in the spring, several chemicals are recommended, e.g. Dacthal, Zyttron, Trifluralin and Bandane. Any of the above weed sprays are available at hardware stores, feed stores etc.

Watch New Lawns
One word of caution, though. If you have a newly seeded lawn, do not use anything stronger than 2, 4-D Amine. In the case any of these products, you may expect good results if you follow the manufacturer's directions. An inexpensive knapsack sprayer is a very good tool for the application of lawn weed killers.

Farmers are also weed sprayed this time of year. Fence bottoms, meadows, spring grain etc., are among the areas of attack. However, perhaps the corn planting operation is receiving the most attention on the farm these days.

Atazine, Simazine and Linuron are the three herbicides recommended and quite widely used to prevent perennial and an-

ual weeds from reducing the grain corn yields. They may be applied as pre-emergence or post-emergence sprays and are in reality miracle chemicals for weed control in any kind of corn crop. They will kill all weeds with absolutely no harm to the corn.

Roadside weed spraying will also soon be in operation. Residents growing 2, 4-D susceptible crops such as tomatoes, turnips, grapes, beans, tree fruits etc., in fields adjacent to roadways, are invited to post "2, 4-D Susceptible Crop" warning signs. This will aid municipal road author-

ities in spotting these susceptible crops. These red and white signs are available free of charge from the Ontario Department of Agriculture Office, Milton, and from the Weed Inspector.

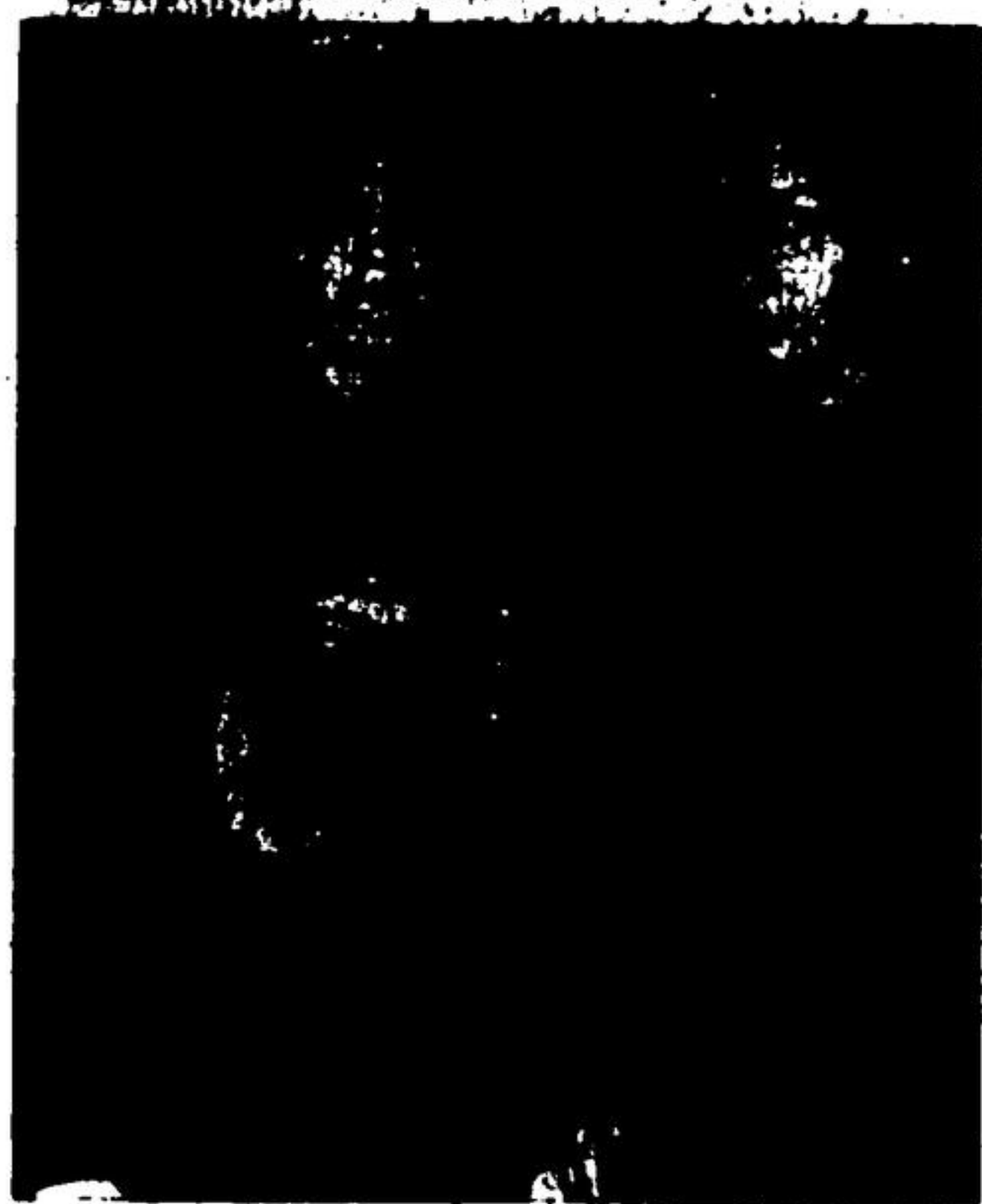
