684 Prisoners

Jail Issues Annual Report

There were 640 prisoners committed to the Halton County Jail in Milton during the year ending March 31, 1965, the Milton Jail annual report issued this week points out. During the year, there were a total of 684 prisoners in custody. The Halton jail accommodates 28 male and three female prisoners. The largest jail population during the year was 33 men

and one woman, while the lowest population was two. Average daily population was six, and the total days' stay worked out to 6,756 days.

First Timers

Of the prisoners, 560 were first time offenders, 30 were second timers, 18 were third timers and 32 had been imprisoned three times or more. Only one prisoner did not have elementary education and 364 had advanced education, while 239 were married and 401 were unwed.

Occupations of the 640 prisoners included: eight agricultural, seven clerical, 27 commercial, 36 construction, 15 domestic, 293 laborers, 79 mechanics, seven personal service, five professional, 52 transportation, 27 manufacturers, 61 others and one without an occupation. The 640 commitments during the year included 620 men and 20 women. Of these, 39 were released on bail, 95 were acquitted and released, 252 paid fines, 40 were released on probation, 59 were released on suspended sentence, 95 served out sentences, 81 were transferred to other institutions and 10 were left for other reasons. Of the 640 prisoners, 556 were Canadian, 18 English, four Irish, 11 Scottish, four United States and 47 from other countries.

The jail staff of 19, under the supervision of Governor E. G. Ryder, was paid salaries totaling \$35,248.89 during the year. Total maintenance (including salaries) came to \$65,603.02 and \$2,286.37 was spent on alterations additions and repairs.

J-G-A Calf Club Judges Jerseys

The regular monthly meeting of the Halton 4-H Jersey-Guernsey-Ayrshire Calf Club was held on May 18 at 8:00 p.m. on the farm of Ernest Alexander near Norval, with 21 members present.

The meeting was opened by president Lorne Ella and after Club business a short discussion on the parts of a cow was given under the direction of Doug McDonnell, assistant agricultural representative.

The senior and junior members were then separated and the seniors were given instructions on how to classify a cow, and later classified one under the excellent instruction of D. H. McCaig.

The juniors were instructed on how to look for the good points of a cow and also a few tips on judging by Mr. McDonnell. The members were brought together again and judged a class of three year old Jersey cows in milk and the seniors gave reasons for placing them.
