Good Make-Up Shown U.C.W.

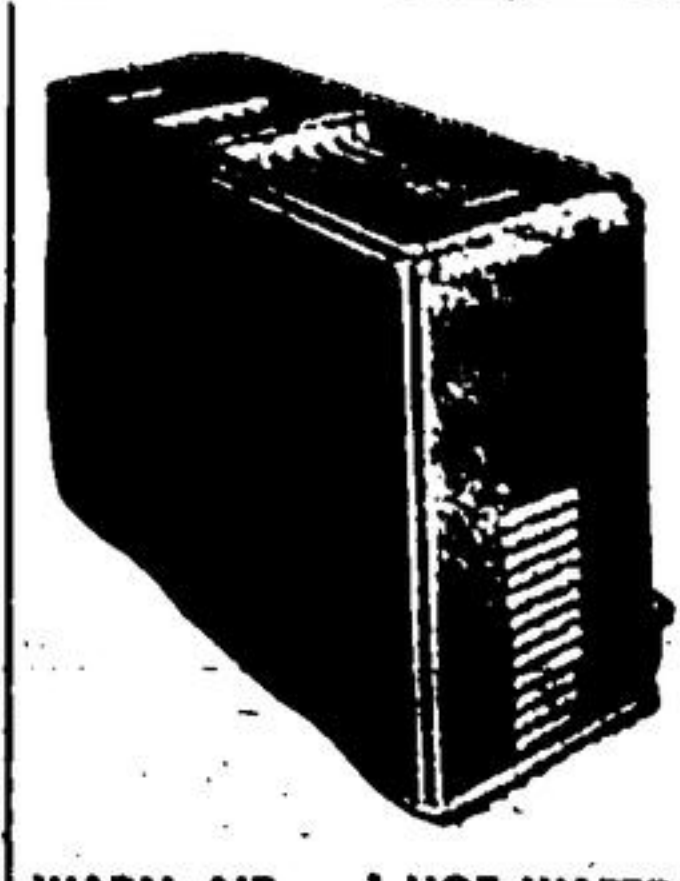
