Forty pure bred Holsteins consigned to the Dominion Special Sale at the Georgetown Sales Arena brought a total of \$29,682 for the excellent average of \$742 each. Sale managers were Rockwood International Ltd., Georgetown. Thirteen milking females averaged \$1,080.77, while 27 bred heifers averaged \$579.07 and one baby brought \$250.

The top price of \$1,000 was paid by Howard Tarzwoll of Georgetown for a three-year-old daughter of Rosale Citation R. She was Glenrobble Citation Laura, who in her first lactation in 405 days produced 13,639 lbs. milk containing 36 per cent butyfat.

Other good prices were \$1,600 paid by Sam Gurr and Son, Brandon, Man., for a six-year-old "very good" cow consigned by Keith Leslie, Georgetown; \$900 paid by Thomas Young, Pa., to John Brander, Norval, for a bred heifer; \$775 paid by Bertram Stewart, Hornby, to Joseph Scherzil, Norval, for a bred heifer; and \$700 paid by Donald C. Davis, Pittsfield, Maine, to A. H. McKane, Georgetown, for a bred heifer.

Kelso Pool Opens in 10 Days Authority Offers Swim Lessons

The swimming and wading pool at Kelso Conservation Authority should open in about 10 days, Hallow Region Conservation Authority field officer Dave Murray reports this week. The pool has been painted and tested and all should be in readiness to welcome an onslaught of swimmers by next weekend.

Swimming will also be allowed at the west end of the Glen Eden Lake at Kelso this year, but no swimming is permitted around the emergency spillway.

The Authority is sponsoring a series of swimming lessons for children and adults again this year. Red Cross swimming classes will be held three mornings a week in July and August, the Royal Lifesaving Society lessons will be arranged Tuesday and Thursday evenings during July, plus August if there is a demand. An adult learn-to-swim or improve your swimming course is also scheduled for noon hours and early evenings every Tuesday. Tests will be conducted at the end of every course, and application forms are available at the Conservation Office, 225 Main St., Milton.

A new venture this year will be the Leader Patrol course for potential pool lifeguards. It will be held June 21 to 26 and a complete course is offered to train experienced swimmers aged 16 or over. Ross Johnson is superintendent of Kelso Conservation Area this year. Judy Abel of Oakville will be back again as swimming instructor, with Mary Jean Coulson of Lowville, David Hongisto of Bronte, Keith Hillson of Milton, Jenny Rousseau of Oakville and Paula Jacobs as assistant instructors. Male lifeguards are still needed for weekend duties.
