Cabbage, Cauliflower Hit

Root Maggots Cause Damage

Severe damage has occurred in some areas during the past two weeks from root maggots in cabbage and cauliflower. Most of the fields inspected showed some damage, however extensive losses were only local.

The adult fly lays its eggs in the soil around the stems of the plant beginning around mid-May. The eggs hatch in about five days and the maggots immediately begin feeding in the root area. When the maggots mature, they pupate in the soil near the roots. There may be as many as three or four broods per year. The maggot over winters in the ground as a pupa.

The best control method used has been treatment with Aldrin at time of planting, in the form of a granular material or a drench to the transplant water. This chemical remained effective for a long enough period that a second treatment was not necessary.

A strain of root maggots not controlled by Aldrin has developed in this area, and as a result some other control is necessary. The materials 50 per cent Diazinon WP or 25 per cent Azinphos-methyl (Guthion) WP used as a drench will control the Aldrin-resistant strain. It may be necessary, however, to repeat the application of these two materials at a later date.

After seeing the poor results obtained in some fields this year and last by using Aldrin, it becomes increasingly important to be aware of the threat created by these Aldrin-resistant maggots. Considerable attention should be paid to this problem by growers in the future, before deciding on a control program to use.

During the regular meeting of Halton County Council last week, members:

- Were assured the deer hunt recommended by representatives of the Department of Lands and Forests would not be endorsed unless neighboring counties were also willing to participate. A three-day hunt was proposed to coincide with the opening days of the hunt in Northern Ontario. Discussions are to be held with neighboring counties. A recommendation is to be presented at the next meeting of Halton County Council.

- Were assured meat inspection of slaughter houses in the county would be undertaken by the province as soon as possible. The Health Unit has been conducting the service in the past but does not have sufficient inspectors to continue this work, which is now a responsibility of the province.

- Heard reports the new home for the aged being constructed adjacent to Halton Centennial Manor was proceeding, after delays in the supply of steel had been overcome.

- Authorized Deputy Clerk Jim Andrews to attend an Industrial Seminar in Honey Harbor in June as the representative of Council.

- Approved the recommendation of the engineer that Robert Blair of Midland be engaged as an Engineering Technician as a salary of \$5,400, to be increased to \$5,670 in six months if proved satisfactory.

- Received a letter from Peel County asking co-operation in the naming of the Boundary Line road between Peel and Halton as "Winston Churchill Boulevard" and accepted the recommendation of the Roads Committee to concur in this request.

- Awarded the contract for centre marking of County roads to the lowest of two tenders, E. A. Horton Sales Ltd. at \$5.95 per gallon of paint applied.

- Authorized all County Council members to attend the Ontario Municipal Convention August 22-25 at the Royal York Hotel, Toronto with the County Assessor and Clerk-Administrator or alternate.

- Heard reports that the County Health Unit requires nine more Public Health nurses as the Unit has only 17 nurses on staff while the County population of 134,700 makes it necessary that 26 Public Health nurses are on staff to carry out a full Unit program. Registered nurses are presently used for visual and hearing testing.

- Approved sponsorship of two students by the Board of Health for the sanitary inspectors course at Ryerson, and efforts to locate high school students interested in the course and offer them the chance to accompany inspectors to find out if they like the work. Only one of three applicants answering newspaper advertisements for inspectors proved acceptable and he is meeting the Chief Sanitary Inspector.

- Purchased one thousand County of Halton decals from the Calad Co. Ltd. for \$102 and

Seek Expense Limit

No Carte Blanche for Warden

A county by-law calling for payment of all expenses incurred by the warden in connection with his duties was referred back to a committee for limiting clauses, during the regular meeting of Halton County Council.

The payment of expenses would be in addition to the present \$3,500 annual salary already provided. Deputy Reeve B. D. Young, of Nassagaweya observed the terms of the by-law were quite broad and some limitations should be placed.

Reeve C. A. Martin, Milton, suggested that under the by-law a warden could take a world tour without any additional permission.

Deputy Reeve R. Goodwin, Acton suggested the by-law left the matter wide open. He praised the efforts of the present warden in promoting the county

Reeve Martin suggested the by-law was not necessary. "Any warden knows he will be reimbursed for legitimate expenses,"

Reeve G. Gallagher, Burlington, suggested the by-law was for clarification in the treasurer's office. There is presently no provision for payment of expenses other than those incurred in attending committee meetings of the County Council.

Warden H. Merriv agreed in this and suggested the matter should be clarified for wardens to come. He suggested consideration be given to limiting any single expense to \$400, with any cost above that to be approved by the personnel committee.

Members agreed to the need for some limitation and referred it back to the personnel committee.
