Ice Flows in July Impress John Root

M.P.P.'s Return from North John Root, the M.P.P. for Wellington-Dufferin was one of the members of the Ontario Legislature who returned from a fact finding tour in Northern Ontario, that took members as far West as the Manitoba border, as far North as Port Severn on Hudson Bay and down along the shore to Winkus and back through the Kapuskasing-Timmins area to Toronto. The trip was organized by the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests to acquaint members of the Legislature and the press with the more remote parts of the Province and with various programs that are being carried out to open up and develop the area and resources.

On his return Mr. Root commented that it was a revelation to see the developments that are taking place and the potentials that exist for further development. It was a new experience for members to travel for six or seven days in aircraft into areas where no roads exist.

Mr. Root said that it was an unforgettable experience to fly over this wilderness area, to see the ice flows floating in Hudson Bay in July to see the sun going down at about 10:00 at night and getting up between 0:00 and 4:00 in the morning and then in a few hours to arrive back in the great Metropolitan city of Toronto and realize that all of this is part of Ontario. He said the South country presents many challenges and opportunities to people who are willing to pioneer and develop an inspiration to witness the enthusiasm of the people who appreciated the opening of the new Highway from Atikokan to Fort Frances and to see the pride of the local people as they pointed out the advantages of the areas in which they resided.

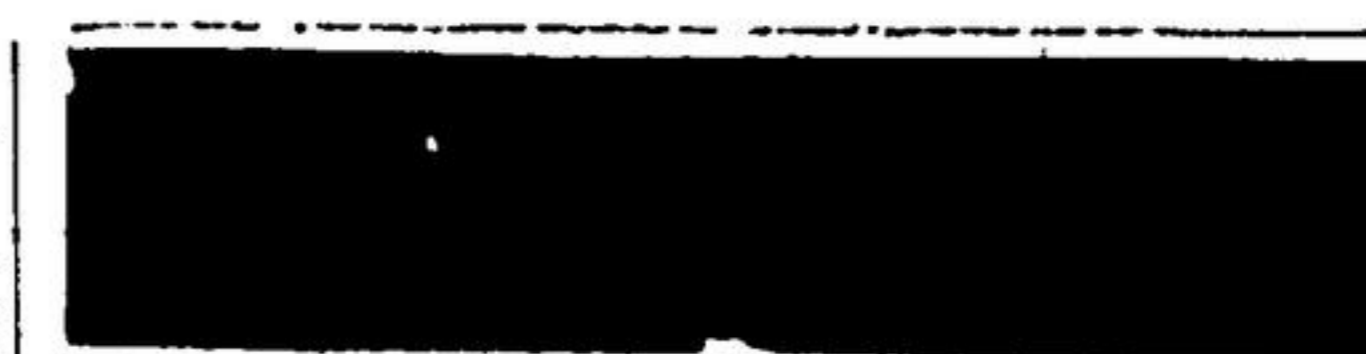
