Approve Maintenance Grants

The approval of grants to the Halton Region Conservation Authority for general maintenance on Authority dams was received by letter from the Department of Energy and Resources, at the Authority's July meeting.

The letter indicated that 75 per cent grants would be available for the general maintenance of dams within the Authority's area. Conservation Authority field officer Dave Murray indicated the grants would prevent mean approximately \$1,500 yearly to the Authority, but he suggested that as the number of dams within the Authority increased, the grants would mean considerably more.

Could Mean Thousands

Grants of 75 per cent will be allowed on hydro, painting, lubrication, telephone and heating charges and equipment checks at the dams. Grants of 75 per cent can also be obtained on periodic overhaul and replacement of equipment as required, which could amount to thousands of dollars, if any major equipment had to be replaced. A grant of up to \$1,000 towards

the salary of a dam operator would also be allowed.

SHARE IN CONSERVATION

Conservation is good business. The efficient management of renewable resources is profitable. Every citizen should share in conservation. Do your part and help prevent forest fires.

At their regular monthly meeting last week, Halton County councillors:

- Passed a supplementary by-law calling for an additional expenditure of \$397,000 over and above the figure approved earlier in the year, for county roads.

- Approved the formation of a County Display Committee to set up an exhibit at the International Plowing Match to be in York County in the fall. Cost of the exhibit, which will be a tent form, is not to exceed \$2,000. Deputy Reeve William Hunter of Georgetown has been named chairman of the committee.

- Approved the appointment of Clifford Hobart of Georgetown as Chief of Emergency Clothing for the Halton County Emergency Measures Organization. A letter will be sent to the Town Clerks of Georgetown and Milton advising that both towns would be in favor of the appointment of a County Assessment Com-

missioner. The Township of Navagawa and the town of Oakville are not in favor of the appointment at this time.
