

Farm Safety Week Begins Saturday



NATIONAL FARM SAFETY WEEK starts on Saturday and lasts through until July 31. Pretty Margaret King of R.R. 4 Milton is only one of many Halton County Junior Farmers who are urging farm safety. Halton Junior Farmers intend to sell "Slow Moving Vehicle" signs that can be attached to tractors and to other farm equipment. The signs are expected to go on sale within a week.

Farm Safety Week, promoted nationally in the United States, will be observed in most of Canada from July 25 to 31, 1965. The National Safety League of Canada is supporting all organizations participating in this most important campaign.

"Safe and Alive in '65" is the theme for this year's Farm Safety Week. It is also a cue for action. Once again, it is time to wage a personal war on accidents. The league urges all farm residents to correct dangerous work and living conditions, as well as dangerous habits and attitudes, before they take their toll of injury and death. Make this week the beginning of a successful campaign to keep the family "Safe and Alive in '65."

4-H Centennial Trip Winners From Milton

Judy Newell, Milton R.R. 3, and Arthur Lawson, Milton R.R. 5, have been chosen from the 4-H Homemaking and Agricultural Clubs in Halton, to participate in the first 4-H Centennial Trip July 26-31. This trip is being made possible by a grant from the National Centennial Commission, and has been organized by the Ontario Department of Agriculture.

The two 4-H members from each county in Western Ontario will travel along the St. Lawrence Seaway, visiting Kingston, Morrisburg, Cornwall and Montreal, and returning via Ottawa, Perth, and Peterborough.

Their leaders will be Doug Young, Associate Agricultural Representative for Grey County, and Mrs. Joan Winfield, Home Economist for Kent and Essex counties.

Judy Newell has completed her Provincial Honors in 12 projects of 4-H Homemaking Club work. She has just completed her Grade 12 Special Commercial Course at the Milton District High School, and is at present working at the P. I. Robertson Company.

Arthur Lawson has completed 21 4-H Agricultural Clubs, and is presently enrolled in the 4-H Hol-

stein, Corn and Engineering Clubs. Last year he was a member of the second place Ontario 4-H Inter-Club Grain team. He has completed Grade 13 and plans to enroll in a Degree Course at the Ontario Agricultural College in the fall.

Four Halton Junior Farmers Capture Firsts at Field Day

Charles McFeeters, Jeff Nurse and the horseshoe pitching team of Ernie Alexander and John Wilson qualified for the Provincial Junior Farmer Field Day Champions when they earned first prizes at the Zone competition held in Guelph recently.

Jeff Nurse finished first in the 880 yard dash against competitors from eight counties to earn his spot in the Provincial Championships. Charles McFeeters was first in the 100 yard dash and Ernie Alexander and John Wilson gained first prize in the horse shoe pitching contest.

Nearly 75 Halton Junior Farmers travelled to the University of Guelph for the annual Zone competitions and in track and field events. Halton County placed third.

Halton's boys' basketball team reached the semi-finals before being eliminated. Members of the team include Jeff Nurse, Art Lawson, John Walowina, Bob Newell and Danny Heathington. The

County's girls' basketball team, with Marlene McCartney, Karen Campbell, Margie King, Lynn Warner, Jill Taylor and Verna Thompson was also eliminated in the semi-finals.

The girls' relay team from the County, Lynn Warner, Jill Taylor, Karen Campbell and Verna Thompson, earned a third and the boys' ball team of Dennis Sinclair, Wayne Heslop, Butch Richardson, Doug Coverdale, Charles Van Sickle, Frank Bertasson, Harold Thompson, Keith Dawson and Larry Campbell reached the semi-finals before being eliminated.

The County's sharp-shooting rifle team of Alan Brownridge, Fred Barnes, Jack Barnes and Bruce Van Fleet earned a second place ribbon.

The first prize finishers are now eligible to compete in the Ontario Junior Farmer Field Day Championships, to be at the University of Guelph in August.

Canadian Jersey Club Awards Won By Five District Cattle

Four Jersey cows owned by area farmers were recently awarded a Ton of Gold certificate and a cow owned by Maurice C. Beatty of Milton was awarded a Life-time Production certificate, according to reports received from the Canadian Jersey Cattle Club.

Life-time Production
The Jersey cow, Lindale Beacon Lassie 1811 — supreme excellent — has just been awarded a Life-time Production certificate. In 9 lactations she produced 84,625 lbs of milk, 4,573 lbs of fat. She is also a winner of one Ton of Gold and is a daughter of the Supreme Sire, Lindale Beacon Bas #13607. This cow is bred and owned by Maurice C. Beatty, Milton, Ontario.

Ton of Gold
In the herd of Fred Nurse, Georgetown, Ont., the Jersey cow Standard Jester's Favorite Kitty #33631, Good Plus, has just been awarded a Ton of Gold certificate, on the production of 2,402 lbs of fat, in 1457 days. She is also a winner of one Gold Medal and one Ton of Gold.

To qualify for this award a cow must produce at least 2,000 lbs. of fat in 4 consecutive years. Emerald Isle R. Royal's Pride, very good, and Rosegate Cham 6, good plus, two Jersey cows in the herd of Mac Alexander, Norval,

Ont., have just been awarded a Ton of Gold certificate.

In 1379 days Emerald Isle produced 2214 lbs. of fat. She is a winner of one Gold Medal and is a daughter of Superior & Century Sire Campbell Really Royal Rosegate Cham 6 produced in 1160 days (3 lact.) 2,251 lbs of fat. This cow is also a winner of three Silver Medals, two Gold Medals and one Medal of Merit and is a daughter of the Superior & Century Sire, Brampton Sixth Generation.

In the herd of Mrs. F. Eleanor Robinson, Georgetown, Ont., the Jersey cow Brampton Classy Carom, Very Good, has just been awarded a Ton of Gold certificate on the production of 2,043 lbs. of fat, in 1461 days. She is a daughter of the Superior Sire, Brampton Carom Beacon #121754.

In the herd of Kenneth Ella & Sons, Hornby, Ont., the Jersey cow Roxanna Generation Flashie, excellent, has just been awarded a Ton of Gold Certificate on the production of 2,315 lbs of fat, in 1446 days. She is also a winner of three Silver Medals and is a daughter of the Superior Sire, Brampton Sixth Generation.

Report on Ponds, Land Use Made

Halton agricultural representative Henry Stanley reported to Halton County Council on farm pond policy and the land use committee.

Mr. Stanley reported that the Halton Conservation Commission which had inaugurated the farm pond policy, was replaced by a county land use committee last year, when the Ontario government began its own farm pond policy. The provincial policy raises the subsidy for farm ponds from \$100 to 50 per cent of the total cost up to \$500. The subsidy may be obtained over a period of years.

The agricultural representative noted that farmers may apply at the Agricultural office for help with surveying and planning farm ponds. He said that 21 farm ponds were approved last year and nine others are in the approval process.

Mr. Stanley said that land use grants are now administered by the Halton Soil and Crop Improvement Association and that the funds of the land use committee have been turned over to the Soil and Crop Association. The movie projector of the land use committee has been turned over to the Halton county agriculture committee and is available at the Agricultural office. Land use grants are available up to \$2,000 a year and are paid equally by the county and the Soils and Crops branch of the Department of Agriculture.
