Acton is not represented in the Canadian Postal Employees Union and the staff here continues to work.

Not Malling

All total mail is going through as usual. This includes all the Acton rural routes

Right Ready to Move

But mail for any out-of-district point is date stamped, sorted and left waiting for pickup

Since the middle of June, Acton has depended entirely upon trucks for mail delivery. Although the strike began last Thursday, things slowed down gradually. The last truck delivery was made Monday morning at 10.30 ain. Since then, no mail has been picked up or delivered

There are no sacks heaped in piles here as in city post offices Everything is orderly and ready to return to normal at a moment's
