Days of the early west are coming back to life at Silver Spur pioneer village not far from Ballinafad.

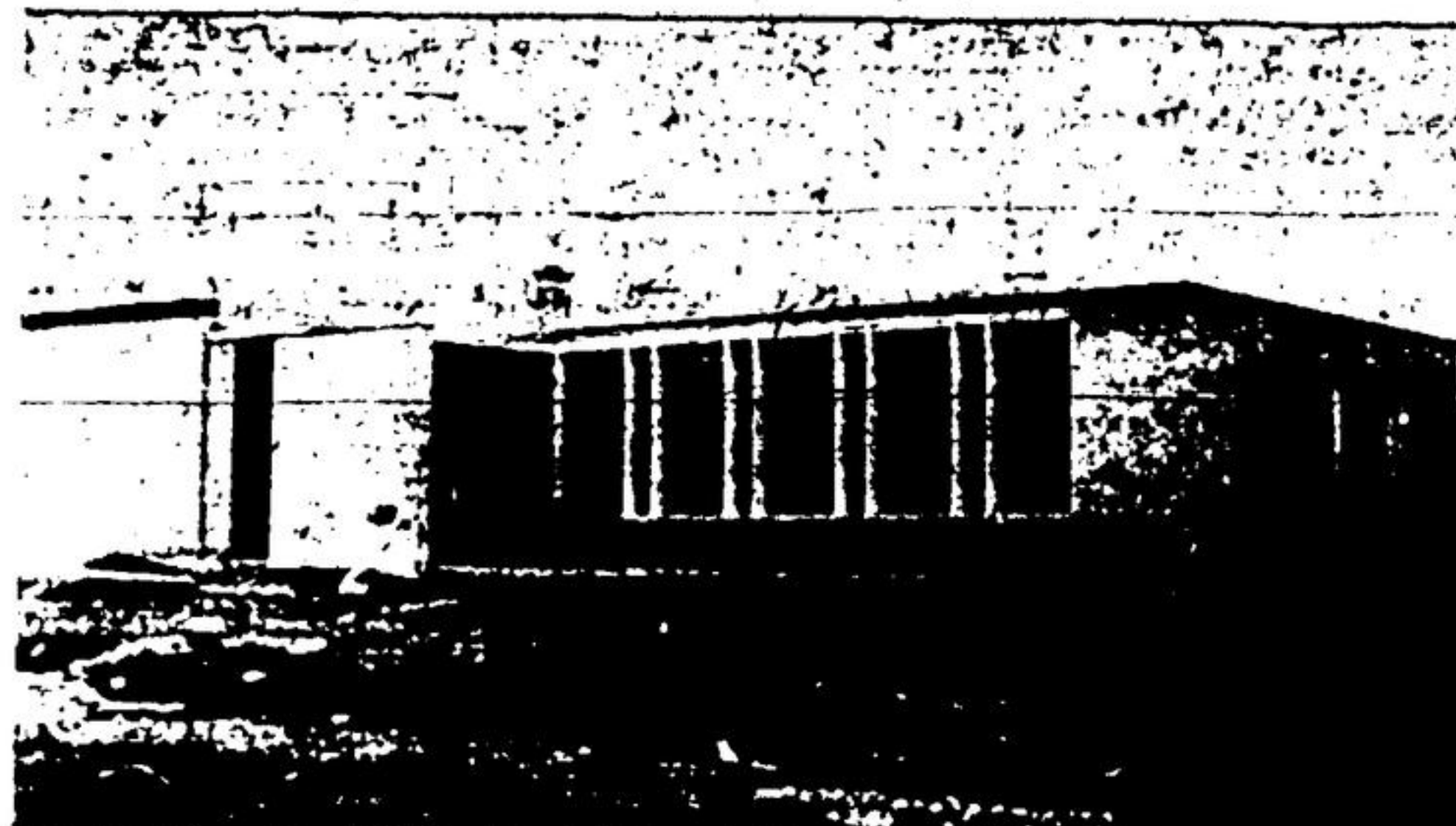
An Indian village and old west town are part of the attractions on 85 acres of land being developed this year as a major tourist magnet. Stage coach rides, horse and pony rides, camping facilities, and nature trails are also provided for the visitors.

Two swimming pools are also to be eventually added.

When all the details are complete the main street will have a general store, doctor's office, newspaper office, bath house, bank, saddle shop, lawyers office, saloon and dancehall, dry goods store, hotel, jail, furniture store, hotel, jail, furniture store, and mortician's office, barbershop, Chinese laundry, gunsmith's shop, livery stable and blacksmith's shop.

An archery range inside an Indian stockade is another item to take the attention of the tourists or picnickers.
