He is survived by his wife, the former Marguerite Ann Joyce Dover, son Kenneth of Acton, seven grandchildren and one great grandchild. A son Frank and daughter Lillian predeceased their father, and the grandparents raised three grandchildren, Jack, Barbara (Mrs. Paul) and Beverly.

Also remaining are sisters Mrs. Edith Hall, William Gaylor, and Lillian of Toronto, Mrs. Alice Danks of St. Petersburg, Florida, and brother Stanley of Toronto.

Funeral service was held at the Rumley Shoemaker funeral home on Tuesday, July 27, conducted by Rev. Dwight Engel. Interment was in Fairview cemetery.

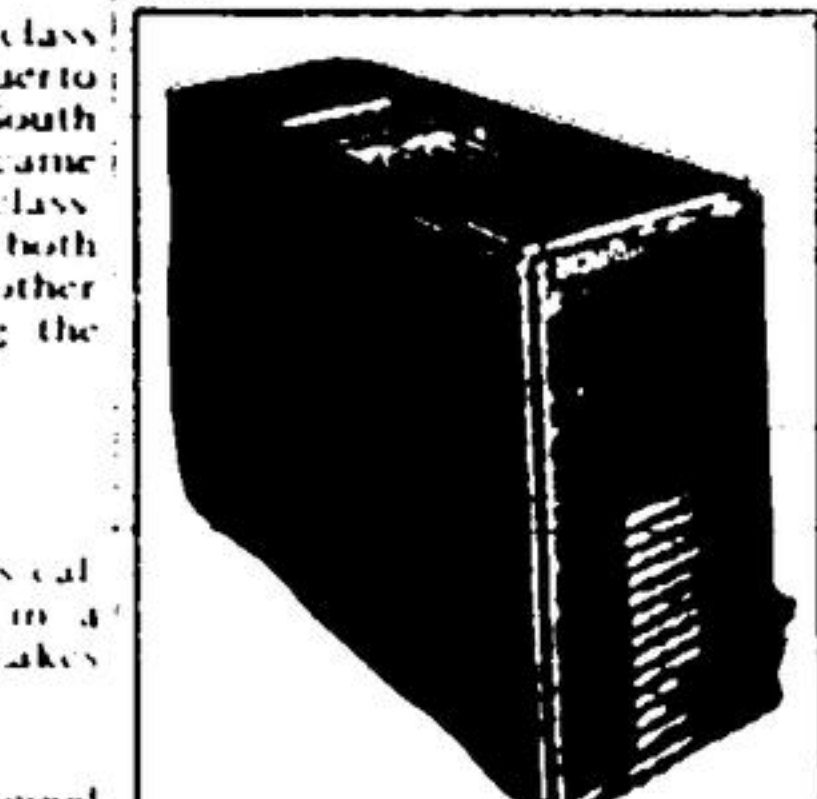
