Rev. Charles Jolliffe Dies Was Missionary in China

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at Rockwood United Church for Rev. Charles J. P. Jolliffe, a missionary in west China for over 30 years. Mr. Jolliffe passed away at his home in Rockwood on Friday in his 87th year.

Rev. Gardiner of Rockwood conducted the funeral services assisted by Rev. Roy Webster, superintendent of missions for the United Church of Canada. Rev. J. Weaver, presbytery chairman and Rev. Newton Bowles of Brampton, a retired missionary who went to China with Mr. Jolliffe in 1902.

Participants were: Ed Pasmory, John Findlay, Rockwood; Neil B.R. Toronto; Elbert Carson, London; Norman Gales, Brampton; and Charles Jolliffe, Pickering.

Interment was in Rockwood cemetery.

Many relatives, friends and colleagues who had worked in the mission field gathered at the old farm homestead at Rockwood, the present home of his son, B. Jolliffe, after the services. Ted was served by Rockwood United Church W.A. under the chairmanship of Mrs. Lloyd Marsden.

Mr. Jolliffe was born in Paisley and farmed at Rockwood until he was 19 when he left to attend the University of Toronto where he graduated in philosophy in 1904.

In 1906 he was one of 24 Methodist missionaries who went to the Far East. He worked chiefly in Szechwan province and was in China during the civil wars in 1919 and 1920. He was decorated by the Chinese government for his Red Cross work.

He built schools, churches and a hospital both at Jenchow and Fuchow. The buildings at Fuchow were destroyed by the Japanese. He left China in 1937 via Siberia, on the last train before the Japanese occupied Manchuria.

After his retirement in 1948, he served congregations at the Barton Stone Church in Hamilton, Glen Williams and Church Hill.

He is survived by his wife, the former Catherine Highlow, three sons: Edward B. of Rockwood, former leader of the C.C.I. party for Ontario; Richard of Toronto and Paul of Milton who is director of Travellers' Aid and was formerly director of Halton Children's Aid Society; two daughters: Mrs. Frances Redman and Mrs. Anne Semple, both of Toronto; and 18 grandchildren.

He was preceded by his first wife, Rev. R. D. Jolliffe, and two sisters: Mrs. Jennie Guild and Annie Jolliffe.
