Four Guernseys Sold At "Eire"

Four Guernseys from Halton County herds were sold at the 12th annual Ontario Classic Guernsey sale at Eire Farms, Cookstown, recently Melvin McCullough from Acton consigned Mar Mel McLeod's Tilly that sold to Gormore Dairy Farm, Dauphin, Man. for \$560 and J. L. Chisholm, Milton consigned Arawana Reliable Gentle for \$550 to the same buyer.

Open Hearts Ideal Orpha, consigned by the estate of H. D. MacPherson, Hornby, was sold for \$675 to Pat O'Connor, Cookstown, and Kingholm Farms, Oakville, sold Kingholm Sally to A. V. and C. L. Grundy, Newmarket, for \$525.

Sale's highest price of \$5250 went for Brookhill R. H. Forest, grand champion Guernsey female at the Royal Winter Fair in 1962 and 1964, which was purchased by Patrick O'Connor, Cookstown and Henry Borden, King — and this was the highest price on record for a Guernsey female at an auction in Canada. The sale averaged \$356 on 34 females.

Begin Applying Fluoride

The application of fluoride to the teeth of three-year-old children in Halton County has begun.

The program, sponsored by the Halton County Health Unit, is being offered to a limited number of Milton and area children this summer. A County-wide program will begin in September. M.O.H. Dr. A. E. Bull strongly recommends the program, which is strictly voluntary, to the parents of all three-year-olds in the County.

The process for the application of fluoride involves a mechanical cleaning of the teeth which are then coated with fluoride. Dr. Bull notes the liquid does not penetrate the enamel of the teeth but changes the molecular structure of the enamel, making the teeth more resistant to decay.

Maximum benefit is obtained when the fluoride is applied at three years of age. The whole process is repeated when the children are four years of age and again when they are five. This gives the children protection throughout their lives.

This program will involve 250 children from Milton and area and a total of approximately 3,000 children in Halton County. Plans for the program to be carried out on three-year-olds every year, thus increasing the number of children protected annually.

"Definite Benefit"

The application of fluoride is a proven method of protecting children's teeth against decay. Dr. Bull says that an experimental program has been carried out in Halton for a number of years

Heat Produces Almost Record Park Attendance

Attendance at the Kelso Conservation Area reached almost record numbers on Friday and Saturday. On Friday 160 cars paid entrance to the park. The usual number for a weekday is 50 cars. One of the highest number of cars to enter the park on a Saturday came last Saturday when 302 were admitted to the area. Large crowds were explained by the hot weather. Sunday attendance was down to 504 cars from the usual number of 900. The record number for a Sunday came on June 27 when 973 cars entered the park.

Cold rains weather cut attendance figures at the park during the Sunday and only 375 cars paid admission. The rain was so heavy on the holiday Monday that admission was not charged and no record of the number of cars entering Kelso was kept.

Four Acton Boys At Training Camp

Andy Van Dijk, Bob Lovell, Raymond Hawkins and Hugh O'Rourke attended the Hamilton Automobile Club Officers' Training Camp at Canterbury Hills Camp, Ancaster, from Wednesday, August 4 to Sunday, August 8 inclusive.

For over 10 years the Hamilton Automobile Club has sponsored the School Safety Patrol movement. During the last five years the number of boys and girls serving on School Safety Patrols in Westworth Halton, Hamilton and Brant Counties has increased to 1,500. Proof of the effectiveness of School Patrols is reflected in the extremely low accident rate among school children in the areas where patrols operate.

Further Training

Officials of the Hamilton Automobile Club felt that there was a need to continue adding to the efficiency of School Patrols in its area. Consequently with the assistance of Police Safety Officers and educators, 72 patrol members were carefully selected from various communities in the Hamilton District, including Burlington, Ancaster, Hamilton, Dunnville, Acton and Waterford to attend Canada's first Officers' training camp.

The camp training consisted of daily lectures, film instruction on patrol work on the job, training at simulated intersections, plus instruction on the responsibilities and conduct of a School Bus Patrol. Also included in the busy four-day course were techniques in care of equipment and how to conduct patrol meetings.

Organization and administration of the Training Camp were handled by H. W. Hilder, Safety Director of the Hamilton Automobile Club, assisted by district Safety Officers, particularly Safety Officer Peter Brimley of Burlington Police Force and Const. Ed Schmidt of the Ancaster Force. Also on hand to assist in training were Const. E. Ellens of the Brantford Police Dept. and Const. G. Spencer of the Dunnville Police Dept.
