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## Holding By-Law to Zone Nassagaweya Agriculture

A township by-law zoning the whole of Nassagaweya as an agricultural area was approved by Nassagaweya councillors at a meeting recently. The by-law, subject to Ontario Municipal Board approval, was described by township clerk Cal McIntyre as "a holding by-law until an official zoning plan for the township can be drafted."

Councillors also approved a motion from the Grand Valley Conservation Authority regarding the assessment of two contemplated dam projects.

Steps were taken to have the Moffat Cemetery registered under the township and a motion was passed requesting the removal of "obstructions" near several town ship roads.
