New Friends They will have the opportunity

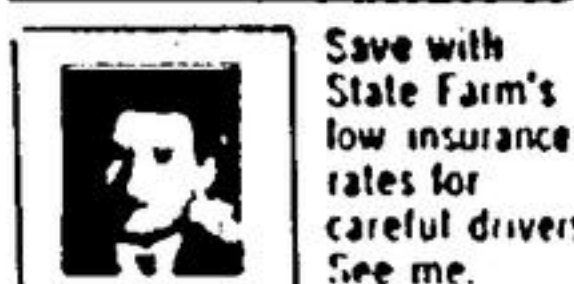
of meeting some 175 girls from 16 counties and 9 districts who will all be living in the Margaret Addison Residence at the University of Toronto.

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1,305 Cars at Kelso Attendance Record

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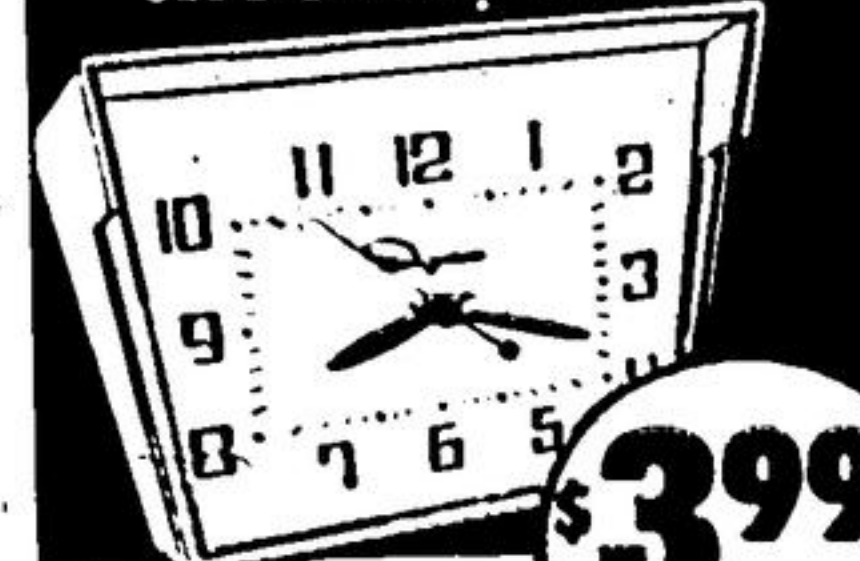
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
