## Galbraith, Egger, Moffat Herds Top D.H.I.A. Class

Production in herds enrolled in the Dairy Herd Improvement Association Program continues to improve.

The 35,000 cows now on test are averaging 10,407 pounds of milk and 300 pounds of fat, compared to 8,244 pounds of milk and 313 pounds of fat in 1954, or an increase of 18 per cent for milk and 21 per cent for fat. During the period the average herd size increased from 18 to 27 cows.

Haltom County has three Dairy Herd Improvement Associations, of the fifty-nine in Ontario. The Haltom West association, under the supervision of George McCormack, was tenth in the Province. The 439 cows in this association averaged 11,036 lbs of milk; 423 lbs of fat. This is an average of 107 and 108 percent respectively, above the average for the breed.

**THE WEED AND THE WIFEZE BUSINESS**

While thousands of people suffer the misery of Hay Fever, I learned of one man who makes his living from it. He lives in Arizona and his business is gathering pollen from plants which produce the tiny microspores that start hay fever victims coughing and sneezing.

Medical men have found that the most effective anti hay fever serums are made from pollens which produce the allergy. This makes it very much in demand and priced for profit, it is one of the most valuable products in the world. According to my information, drug companies pay from three to five dollars a gram for this yellow pollen dust. A gram of the sneeze powder is slightly larger than an aspirin tablet, so the total amount produced in a vacant lot of ragweed would probably be worth a million. The "Weed and Wifeze Business" has been known to net him as much as six hundred dollars in one morning.

**Shake off Pollen**

How does he collect his sneezers' gold? Well, when he first started he used to go along and hold a jar under each plant shaking the pollen into the jar. This method was too slow so now he carries a portable vacuum cleaner with a funnel shaped end on the suction hose which gathers pollen from the plants. In Arizona, Bermuda grass is the highest yielding plant with "Ragweed" running a close second.

Common ragweed is the worst offender in this area so all residents are urged to destroy this noxious weed. You can pull it out, though it under or spray it with 2,4-D and other chemicals.

Perhaps after reading this article someone may rig up a portable vacuum cleaner and get into the "Weed and Wifeze Business."
