## 5,000 Rainbow Trout for Lake

Already known for its excellent trout fishing, Glen Eden Lake at the Kelso Conservation Area west of Milton will soon become an angler's paradise. Another 5,000 Rainbow Trout will be stocked there this week, Halton Region Conservation Authority field officer Dave Murray reported this week.

The fish, all about a year and a half old, will be placed there by the Department of Lands and Forests, he said. The Department recently changed its policy, after an earlier refusal to stock the lake because the public is charged admission to the Kelso park complex.

This week's addition to Rainbow brings to 15,500 the number of fish stocked in the lake. When the man-made lake first opened the Department put 3,000 Speckled Trout there. Two years ago 5,000 Rainbow were added, and earlier this summer the Ontario Agricultural College at Guelph put in another 500 Rainbows as a study on fish movements and growth.

**Select Committee on Conservation Authorities**

The Select Committee appointed by the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario to inquire into and review the provisions of The Conservation Authorities Act and such other Acts of the Legislature relevant to the powers exercised by conservation authorities as the Committee may deem appropriate
