**Full Season
Lutheran Camp**

(Intended for last week)
Several years ago, Eden Mills Edgewood Park was sold to the Lutheran churches and has been used as a camping ground yearly for children, 10 years of age and over. The camp opens officially on July 4, but the month of June is confined to picnic groups renting the park and its facilities.
