Joe Petric, a lad with much talent, played several selections on his accordion.

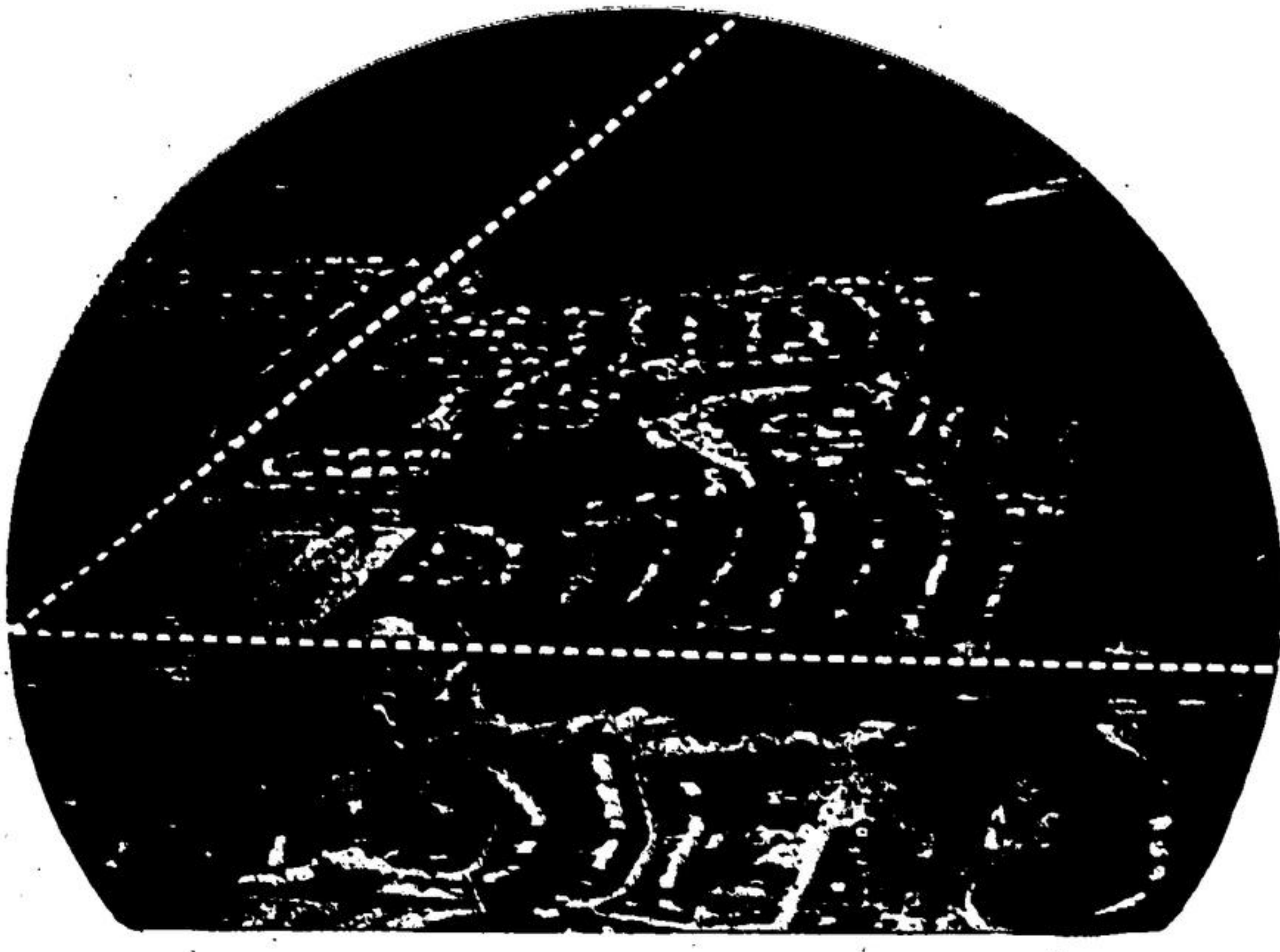
Humorous Reading
