

Expect 3,581 Pupils Back to School When Classes Begin Tuesday Morning

High School

Principal E. A. Hanson of Acton District High School expects close to 440 pupils at the high school this fall. Last year's enrolment was 431.

He is planning on having five Grade Nine classes, four Grade 10 classes, four Grade 11 and three Grade 12, of which one will lead to the Grade 13 course. From one of these courses, Hanson expects several students to take the Special Commercial course.

This year, there will only be one Grade 13 class, which is a change from last year when there were two classes.

Also this year for the first time, there will be an additional course—Student Driver Training—which has been set up as extra-curricular after regular school hours. It will be taught by staff member C. Rognvaldson, who took a two-week summer course under the supervision of the Department of Transport.

One-Room Schools Just Won't Quit Yet

The use of the one-room school isn't going over just in Halton County. They refuse to give up!

The Kalso school of Charlotte, which closed in June of this year, was supposed to be Halton's last operating one-room school. But Oakville Board of Education is having forward two one-room schools this fall, one in Strathroy which was holding up building additions of tower consolidated schools.

The building is the one-room Palumbo School on Highway 5 just east of Palumbo Interchange. Registered to the group has some years ago, it has recently been used as a band hall for the Palumbo-sponsored band.

20 Children Enroll At Sunshine School

The Sunshine School at Hornby will have 20 children enrolled in the fall term when school opens next week, principal Mrs. R. P. Jeffares reports. Ten of these children will attend the all-day senior class and the other 10 will be juniors, attending a half day of classes.

Mrs. Jeffares returns as principal assisted by teachers Mrs. Tom Mitchell and Mrs. Don Hancock. Volunteers Mrs. George Elliott, William Roberts and Bill Van Oosten will teach the children music, art and carpentry respectively.

Mary Anne Ford returns as teachers' helper and Rev. M. Christensen will handle the transportation of the children to and from school.

425 in Nassagaweya

Returning to classes in Eramosa Township this term will be 425 pupils who will take classes in four schools this year.

Enrolment in the eight-room public school at Rockwood is expected to be 365; Eramosa's seven-room school will house 246 pupils; Four Corners school with two rooms expects 68 pupils while Eden Mills two-room school will accommodate 62 this term.

School Inspectors Work is Increasing

Public School Inspectors Oswald G. McDowell and W. L. McNeill will still be inspecting schools in North Halton and a section of Westworth County this year, although both inspectors note some changes in the schools under their supervision.

Both work from the Court St. office in Milton.

McDowell handles inspectorate duties in Halton No. 1, which includes Morningside and Nassagaweya Township schools as well as Georgetown. He reports the Kalso school has closed and the Nassagaweya Board is opening two new rooms at Brookville school this fall.

The same board is inaugurating kindergarten classes at both Brookville and Campbellville schools. In Eramosa, Stouart-Jowa school is beginning junior and senior opportunity classes, while a three-room addition at Glen Williams will be ready for the opening of school, and two room additions at both Linehouse and Massey schools are under construction.

23 New Teachers

In this area, 17 teachers have retired since last June and 23 new ones have been engaged.

Mr. McNeill covers the schools in Acton, Milton, East Flamboro and Waterdown schools.

Mr. McNeill will have 136 teachers in his area this year, an increase of 10 over last year. For the first time since his inspectorate area was formed, all the school boards in Milton, Acton, Waterdown and East Flamboro will be providing opportunity classes and kindergarten accommodation for students. Acton is beginning opportunity work this year and East Flamboro is just opening up both fields. The inspector said the movement toward establishing school libraries is also going ahead rapidly in all schools.

The new mathematics system which began in Grade 7 last year will be used in both Grades 7 and 8 this year, he noted.

Mr. McNeill's inspectorate will include Milton's new senior public school this year.

Robert Little

Garnet McKenzie, principal of the Robert Little Public School, has released the names of the teachers on his staff for the coming year. However, the number of pupils expected is not available until after the pre-registration which takes place this week at the school. Enrolment last year was 525.

This year, two Grade Six classes will be held in the old Stone School and an arts room will also be established there. Last year, the building was vacant but previous to that, it had been occupied by high school students for a time while the addition to the high school was being completed.

A special class for pupils from both public schools from Grade One and up will also be established this year at the Robert Little school and will be taught by Mrs. Doreen Byerman.

Industrial Arts this year will be taught by John Lewis with Mrs. June Doberhien returning to teach Home Economics. Glenn Banks is music supervisor again for the next term. Mrs. William Spielvogel returns as secretary to the principal.

Expect 641 Pupils in Eramosa To Start Classes September 7

Principal Elmer Smith at the M. Z. Bennett public school has geared his staff for the start of the fall term September 7 and has everything in readiness for pupils to begin classes. Although the estimated number of pupils is not available for publication this week until after pre-registration, last year's enrolment was 415.

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Over 1,581 pupils go back to school in this district and close to 1,600 in Acton alone this coming Tuesday. Record high enrolment is expected everywhere but principals and staff members are prepared for the busy flow of traffic opening day. Board members have ironed out bus routes.

Acton High school with its recent addition fully completed draws 440 scholars. The M. Z. Bennett school had an enrolment last year of 415 and this is not expected to change. The Robert Little expects close to the same as last year which was 525 pupils.

Brookville school, in Nassagaweya township expects an enrolment of 1215, including schools about 1215 and Eramosa schools expect 641 pupils, not all these students in this district. The Sunshine school at Hornby expects an enrolment of 20 pupils with some from Acton town.

As usual some leave town for city schools or private schools while others will be attending universities or technical schools.
