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

Voluntary Basis

Change Vaccination Program

Calibrated vaccination under the commencing January 1, 1966, the Brucellosis Act will be placed on a voluntary rather than a mandatory basis on January 1 of next year. The Veterinary Services Branch of the Ontario Department of Agriculture announced today. However, the Department will continue to pay for the vaccination services rendered to livestock owners by veterinarians.

In Harold Wartan, Director of the Branch has notified all veterinarians concerned of the changes in the governing legislation and has advised the profession that although it is legal until December 31, 1965, to exact the rate as up to and including the start date, farmers and stockmen are urged to insist on continued vaccination or rates set over the new start date. Dr. Wartan also intended that more precise information be provided to stockmen.
