The John Howard representative added "Hamilton and West worth have decided to go along without Halton if necessary. If this opportunity is passed up it may be a long time before anything new can be worked out for this county."

Deputy Reeve Goodwin pointed out an earlier proposal for a Halton-Peel-Wellington jail had fallen through, and Peel officials were reluctant to even talk about it again, pending the Plunkett report.

Reeve H. H. Hinton of Acton, calling for a delay until the Needs Study is completed, said Halton wanted new jail facilities but "is a question of where and when we do it." Reeve Hinton also objected to the Province's small grants for maintenance and transportation, adding police would have to transport their own prisoners to and from jail and this would be a hardship for small municipalities like Acton with a four or five man police force.

Oakville Deputy Reeve Lester Whiting attempted to put forth a motion delaying jail discussions until Reeve Gallagher and Deputy Reeve Coulter returned, but was told his motion was out of order with an amendment already on the floor. The meeting got bogged down in a procedural hassle and finally Warden Herb Merry called a vote on the amendment favouring a hold up until the Needs Study is completed.

The votes were 15 in favor and 13 against, but according to a Private Bill in the Ontario Legislature—so the councillors came to a stalemate. Only four of the 12 councillors in attendance favoured the Hamilton plan, and they were Deputy-Reeve Goodwin,

OBITUARY

Allen W. Norton Limehouse Resident

Active in the stone quarrying business for most of his life, Allen W. Norton, 80, died in Georgetown Hospital on September 6.

Mr. Norton was the son of James and Mary Jane Allen Norton. He was born in Glen Williams, spent his youth there, and for the past 51 years had made his home at Limehouse.

Mr. Norton opened a quarry at Limehouse, later sold it to Sam Hurst for whom he managed it, then managed the Rogers and Hurst Quarry, north of Glen Williams. He later purchased the old Lagan Quarry and operated it for several years under his own name.

From his quarries came the stone for the Hamilton Cathedral, the Toronto Museum, Don Tap Observatories and the Botany Building in Queen's Park. He and his sons built the Lime Kiln that is noted as a landmark on the Bruce Trail, north of Glen Williams.

He was a hockey player in his youth and competed in walking races which were popular in those days. He was a member of Limehouse Presbyterian Church.

He leaves his wife, Jane Trotter, five children, Mrs. J. Campbell (Jessie) of Hamilton, Stanley and Lorne of Acton, Harvey of Limehouse and Mrs. Ronald Lamer (Ruth) of Milton, eight grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren. He was predeceased by two brothers and three sisters. Mr. and Mrs. Norton celebrated their 59th wedding anniversary on May 2 this year.

Rev. Norman Young conducted the funeral service Wednesday, September 8, at the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home, Georgetown, and interment was in Glen Williams cemetery. Pall bearers were Ross Norton, Jack Norton, Jim Bailey, Wayne Mason, Allan Norton and Bill Campbell, Hamilton.

Parade, Inspections, Poster Contest On Agenda for Fire Prevention Week

Fire Prevention Week will be celebrated from October 3 to 9 this year, and the Halton County Fire Prevention Bureau is making plans for a full-scale educational campaign to acquaint Halton residents on the need for fire safety.

Distribution of 25,000 restaurant place mats and thousands of supplementary pieces of literature, fire hall open houses, a church parade, an inspection blitz for commercial and industrial buildings, school drills, home fire drills and a poster drawing competition are among the highlights of the busy week.

Municipal councils in each Halton municipality are lending support to the firefighters' campaign by proclaiming the seven-day "Fire Prevention Week in Halton."

Learn While You Lunch
Anyone who eats in a Halton

restaurant during Fire Prevention Week will receive a little lesson in fire safety for the Bureau is providing 25,000 free place mats bearing fire prevention hints to restaurants and dining rooms across the county. For several years Bureau members have found this an effective means of gaining public attention, and this year the place mats were redesigned for a more effective message.

Close to 100 firefighters from the five Halton brigades are expected to join in the Bureau's annual church parade in Milton, this Sunday morning, September 26. The men will march from the curling club on Muldise Drive to St. Paul's United Church for the 11 a.m. service, and the Lorne Scots Military Band conducted by Lt. F. G. Corlett will head the parade.

The Bureau, in conjunction with local fire brigades, sponsors an annual poster competition for Grade 5 students which was launched in early September in the elementary schools. Entries will be awarded the top boy and girl artist, at a banquet in their honor in November. Their winning posters will also be entered in an all-Ontario competition early next year.

Georgetown and Acton commercial and industrial buildings are in for a one-day inspection blitz during Fire Prevention Week, as teams of insurance company representatives and firefighters conduct their annual inspection for fire hazards. The Halton Bureau sponsors the blitz in conjunction with the Acton and Georgetown firefighters and major insurance companies.

Busy Week
Several other programs, including school evacuation drills and inspections, fire hall open houses, safety demonstrations and film nights will be conducted by member fire departments with the sanction of the Halton Fire Prevention Bureau.

Bureau chairman Lt. Wes Miller of Oakville Fire Department said, "Fire prevention is a year-round task for everyone in Halton County. During this year's observance of Fire Prevention Week, we hope to impress upon every citizen the need for constant awareness of the danger of fire—not just for seven days, but for 365 days a year, every day."
