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Fabric Flammability Studied by Experts

Ladies, do you know that if you are dressed in a cotton slip and a nylon dress, you will have less chance of a severe burn by fire than if you are dressed in a nylon slip and cotton dress?

Or that a flared skirt will spread fire quicker than a suit of the same material?

The shippers' explanation, by Canadian fire scientists, is that cotton is more flammable than nylon (for other man-made fibres), therefore will ignite faster. The man-made fibres, on the other hand, will cause deeper and more severe burns once a melting point is reached.

The flared skirt hazard has been proved in experiments. An easily comprehended illustration is that of a square dancer swirling near a hot stove, wearing not a sheath but a crinoline.

However, ladies, here's an interesting point: more men than women died in the 10 year period 1954-63 due to accidental ignition of clothing. But women and children, grouped together, do exceed the masculine record, shown by causes:

Burning rubbish: 16 men; 5 women; 22 children; total 43. Candles and torches: 4 men; 3 women; 3 children; total 15. Electrical appliances: 23 men; 22 women; 51 children; total 96. Fireplaces and open grates: 2 men; 1 woman; 2 children; total 5.

Furnaces, stoves etc.: 97 men; 87 women; 182 children; total 366. Smoking and matches: 119 men; 59 women; 44 children; total 222.

Smoking in bed: 163 men; 60 women; 1 children; total 226. Miscellaneous causes: 33 men; 29 women; 27 children; total 89. 10 year total: 457 men; 266 women; 339 children; total 1062.

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20th Anniversary Celebrated By Legion Ladies Auxiliary

Two former president, Mrs. D. Divsdale and Mrs. W. Maddox returned to Acton Royal Canadian Legion on Friday evening as guests of honor during the Legion Ladies Auxiliary's 20th anniversary dinner.

Formed 20 years ago of July 5th, the auxiliaries postponed the celebration until the fall, due to the summer holiday season.

Greetings were brought from Mrs. Florence Pegg, provincial chairperson of Ontario Provincial Command Ladies' Auxiliaries.

Dr. L. H. O.M.B. Reserves Decision On Milton Annexation Bid

Milton's application to annex 579 acres from Esqueping and 2206 acres from Oakville was completed before the Ontario Municipal Board in a three day hearing last week. No decision on the application was given by Board members A. H. Arrell and J. V. Ludgate.

The application, if granted, would quadruple the present town of 1064 acres.

During the three-day hearing in the County Administration Building a parade of witnesses testified on services, planning and economic aspects of the application.
