Miss Barbara Christie of the Simplicity Pattern Co. demonstrated the latest styles for the Modern Miss last Thursday. Twenty chosen girls from Mrs. Orr's Home Economics classes modelled everything from pyjamas to evening gowns.

No. 1 on the program was Barbara Frost attired in beret, jacket, two-piece dress and blouse. The dress (Simplicity 6077) was of a bright red and gold checked material and reversible beret (Simplicity 4170) matched perfectly. Blouse (Simplicity 6136) was worn under a jacket (Simplicity 5827) made from gold flannel.

Jane O'Gorman modelled the second costume — a straight styled one-piece dress with detachable collar and tie (Simplicity 6096). White bonded material was set off by two rows of large white buttons running down the front.

Model No. 3, Sylvia Hanusick, displayed another variation of the same pattern. This time No. 6096 was made of a black and white check with black hip belt for added charm.

Next Anna May Buschene, wearing a one-piece dress and jacket (Simplicity 6041), took her stroll across the stage. Both dress and jacket were of a heavy green color.

A jumper (Simplicity 6098) and blouse (Simplicity 6052) were next in line. Roberta Nesset, wearer of the combination, seemed to like the navy and white checked fabric from which it was made.

Zenith Armstrong stepped smartly in a "Hecksiede" coat (Simplicity 6189) and scarf, under which was worn a two-tone dress (Simplicity 6060), the bodice of Hecksiede and the A-line skirt in Roman rib corduroy.

No. 7 was Nancy Gordon in blouse, sleeveless jacket and skirt. Blouse was a "Pageant

Print", jacket was Roman rib corduroy and skirt was Rock suede (Simplicity 6131).

Another one-piece dress in "Forest Glade" with "lobster" dickey (Simplicity 5864) was modelled by Joan Gibbons.

No. 9 turned out to be a slit skirt with attached shorts and matching shirt blouse (Simplicity 6099). Gene Savaryski looked chic with combination of hemlock, "Firebird" (corduroy skirt) and "Cordette" print in the blouse material.

Jumpers and blouse sets seem to be very popular. Linda Gordon modelled another of the favorite jumpers of baby blue "Dorobina" and blouse of "Pageant Print".

Chris Abumani smiled at the audience from the stage wearing a green jumper (Simplicity 6134) and a blouse, also green (Simplicity 6138).

Anne McMillan received a round of applause after showing red pyjamas in "Pageant Print" (Simplicity 6093). The Sanforized fabric used was lined and quilted.

At this point in the proceedings there was a five minute intermission, after which Linda Radston sang a delightful solo. Mr. Hansen's piano accompaniment.

Following another break, Betty Provo, Beverly Brunelle, Jenny Dombros and Brenda Ramsey showed how versatile a pattern can be. Slacks, jackets, skirts, jumpers, blouses, tops and dresses made of matching materials, were maximized for a most becoming effect.

Party dresses of pale blues and yellows were the choices of three models — Jane Cooper (Simplicity 6122), Sharon White (Simplicity 6005) and Irene Anderson (Simplicity 5933) looked nice enough to be the belle of any ball.

The grand finale was a full-length green empire waisted evening gown made out of the new fabric "cotton velvet" worn by Mary Sullivan (Simplicity 5966). Every girl would probably love to have this or any other costume shown. All in all, this year certainly is a bright one fashion-wise.
