were reasons enough to call a plebiscite.

Personal guarantees signed notes for \$5,000 to allow the erection of the bandhall, Mr. Elliott explained. The band had proceeded with the building on the strength of the grant and if the grant was cut off, it would not be fair to require these guarantors to pay. He said the probable solution might be to ask council for the money to pay off the loan or sell band instruments and use the money to pay the loan and then turn over the band hall to council.

Mayor Duby stated that even though the band budget amounts to a half-million, it can still be questioned by council. He was of the opinion the band should not be subjected to the whims of future councils in handing out the annual grant. He stated council was naturally concerned about tax dollars but felt the subject of the plebiscite was untimely.

Mr. Braida told council it was the intention of the band to obtain a charter after the new band hall is opened and in the event the band disbands, all band assets would be turned over to the town.

Mr. Elliott told council "We can take anyone and teach them to play an instrument. We would also like to consider having girls in the band, but it creates a problem at present."

Before the delegation left council chambers, Mayor Duby thanked members for their excellent presentation and commended the band for erecting the band hall on its own initiative as well as for the service the band provides for the town.

## Annexation Decision Disappoints Milton

The Ontario Municipal Board's decision on Milton's annexation application was a big disappointment to Milton councillors, who are considering a protest. The partial decision gave Milton 214.8 acres of the 2,680 Milton was seeking to annex from Oakville and Esqueping. The O.M.B. noted the decision of the remainder of the land would be withheld until Tom Plunkett has completed his regional study on Halton and Peel.

The town had been led to understand the needs study would not affect the legislation. A previous application had been turned down on the grounds the town did not seek enough land. Editorially, the Milton newspaper calls the decision a "325,000 walk down the garden path."

The land granted from Esqueping includes industrial and commercial property bounded on the east by Highway 25, on the south by the Base Line, on the north by Highway 401 and on the west by a line drawn level with Milton's present west boundary — about one-quarter concession.

Included in the land are John von Brov trucking lot, Ley Willy farm, Murray Hood Drive In, Tip In Tire Store and Canadian Truck Leasing.

A second parcel in Esqueping gives Milton a stretch of land north of the Base Line, from Highway 25 east to the present east town boundary (just east of Ontario St.), 200 feet in depth.

From Oakville the Board granted Milton the entire commercial area at Milton Plaza including all the stores and parking lot.
