That's one conclusion this furrychecked scribbler can draw after attending a WO.A.A meeting Saturday and an O.H.A. meeting Monday. And the O.H.A., after countless years denying it's so, has

admitted it in writing. Here's one of their latest epistles:

"The Ontario Hockey Association is attempting to revive Intermediate Hockey throughout the Province. While it is true, that there are a lew strong groups operating, there has been a gradual decline in the number of clubs operating

throughout the Proxince "The OHA Luccutive is concerned about this decline, and has discussed the situation thoroughly on different oc casions. The consensus of the Executive is that if we are to increase entries in the Intermediate series, we must return to "home brew" status in desired areas. While there have been several reasons presented for the decline in the Intermediate series, the most popular explanation seems to be that clubs trying to remain competitive, brought in players and offered payment. Then local players demanded equal treatment, and consequently teams priced themselves out of existence. I know this to be a fact in my own district.

"Another reason offered for the decline, is the change in manufacturing methods in industry, which has caused so many players to be employed on shift work. This is felt to he a factor in industrial municipalities.

"At the last Annual Meeting of the O.H.A., the Executive presented, and won unanimous approval of a resolution, empowering the Executive to set any regulations needed to get Intermediate Hockey back to the position where most towns had clubs operating in this series.

"This letter is being forwarded to all present and formor operators of Intermediate clubs, and to editors of meet papers throughout the jurisdiction of the O.H.A., with the hope that interest can be restored in the Intermediate series."
