Mr. Masson stressed there is a need for someone with some aggressive salesmanship for Canada. He praised Conservative George Hees for the job he did but suggested "I'm not saying George is the man to lead our party, but I think he deserves credit for the job he did."

Still Good on Plows

Plowmen Win at International

Plowmen from Halton County proved at the International Plowing Match that they can cut furrows as good as anyone. During the Match, held at Milliken from October 13-16, Halton plowmen captured many awards and took home considerable prize money.

Keith Leslie of R.R. 4, Georgetown won \$50 for first prize in the tractor utility class for two or more furrows. In the open class for horses, open or jointer plows, Stan May won first money of \$75 while his brother

Lloyd May was second, good for \$60 cash.

John Brecken and Janet Taylor of Burlington teamed up to win \$54 in prize money in the Inter-secondary school competition. In class 12 for tractors mounted, two or more furrows, Bert Robertson of Acton was seventh, Dwight May was eighth, John Wilson was ninth, Bryan Marshall finished 18th and Larry Pickett was 21st.

Lloyd May finished sixth in class 14 for horses, open or jointer plows, and Stan May was eighth. In class 17 for tractors, mounted plows, two or more furrows, Dwight May was second, Keith Leslie finished third, good for \$50 cash in the tractors mounted plows, open, two or more furrows.

In class 22, tractors, utility, two furrows, mounted plows, John Wilson finished third and won \$40 in cash but just missed winning a trip to a Canadian Province.

In class 23, tractors, two or more furrows, mounted plows, the Halton senior champions in the Junior Plowing Match, Larry Pickett and Bryan Marshall finished fifth and won \$30 in prize money.

John Wilson finished fifth in the tractors, mounted plows, open, while Larry Pickett was ninth and Dwight May was 13th. In class 27 for tractors, utility class, two or more furrows, mounted or trailer, George Dixon won first prize money of \$75.

In the horse show, also held, Stan May's entry finished third, good for \$30 in prize money.

Two Wild Dogs Kill 7 Sheep

Two wild dogs wreaked havoc on a flock of sheep owned by Gordon Thompson of R.R. 2 Milton last week, killing seven and scaring the rest of the flock.

Mr. Thompson reported he shot and seriously wounded one of the dogs and the other was located later and shot. He estimated his loss at about \$250 but also noted that sheep when seriously frightened may not bear young for up to two years. "That's where I'm really loss on it," he said.
